

The River Lugg Navigation

In the fourteenth year of the reign of King Charles the Second Parliament made an Act granting Messrs. Sandys the private right to make the Rivers Wye and Lugg navigable for themselves, their heirs and assigns, and no others and to receive all profits.

This was to improve the availability of transportation in the County of Hereford enabling trade to be increased for the benefit of the inhabitants, for the conveyance of ships timber and a continual nursery of seamen for the supply and service of his Majesty's Navy.

The market being cheaper at Bristol a boat fitted for passengers as well as merchandise was to go weekly between Hereford and Bristol charging a fare not exceeding two thirds of the land route fare applying in the months of June and July when the mud roads were in their best condition.

The Act also provided that if the work was not completed by 29th September 1665 that other persons could be appointed instead.

Messrs. Sandys tried to build locks and weirs, as they had done on the River Avon, but the flow of the River Wye was faster, the locks slightly made and in a few years they were in ruin. The weirs were preventing the fish from swimming up the River Wye and nothing at all was done to make the River Lugg navigable.

A further Act was then made, nominating the Bishop of Hereford and other local dignatories with all the powers and authorities to open up the Rivers, clearing away the locks and weirs, enabling the fish to swim upstream, and declaring them to be common for all his Majesty's subjects to use them freely for the good and benefit of the inhabitants of the County for ever.

Records show that much use was made of the River Wye; which continues today with Mr. Barton's "Wye Invader" floating restaurant at Hereford; and whilst less use was made of the River Lugg, Leominster Church bells were brought to Leominster by barge up the River Lugg.

Now the point of interest to the Hereford and Gloucester Canal Society is that the canal aquaduct over the River Lugg, being very low, clearly obstructed the public's right to navigate the river, and its replacement would do likewise, and be unlawful, risking court action securing its removal.

It is interesting to note that when the Act was made for the Hereford to Worcester Railway, which crosses the River Lugg south of the canal, and which was applied for after the canal had been built, that provision was made to allow for the passage of river traffic, with a towing horse crossing which has only been fenced off in the last couple of years. The railway records show that not only was a River Lugg navigation company showing interest but the Lord of the Admiralty was named.

To avoid this obstruction problem it may be wise to consider the possibilities of lowering the canal to river level, and crossing through the river, rising up through locks on both sides. This may solve the problem of providing a clear waterway under the aquaduct to today's flood prevention standards, and avoid the expense of an aquaduct. Much would depend on a suitable design and availability of water filling the canal on both sides of the river.

It would also connect the River Lugg navigation to the canal, but I doubt anybody will ever go to Bristol shopping by barge, or Mr. Barton's Wye Invader get to serve dinner at Leominster.

RESTORATION ORGANISER.

I would like to extend my thanks to the Society for electing me as your Restoration Manager. These are just a few brief notes on the work I have done so far since I joined you.

Sunday 2nd April; Peter Ball kindly loaned his new excavator to us for the day enabling me to excavate about three hundred yards of canal wide enough for a small boat. This plus the rest of this section will be fully dredged

in July.

Easter weekend a small group of H & G volunteers and W R G visitors spent their holiday clearing a section of canal at Newent. Scrub and fallen trees were removed from the short section between the lock and road. The lock was cleared of growth and work was started on clearing below the lock heading towards Newent. We are now awaiting permission from the owner to dredge the bed and fill the short section above the lock with water to a shallow depth for the present. A small dam would be put here to stop the water damaging the lock chamber. Very little silt need removing here as the depth is almost correct at the moment.

On the weekend of 16 & 17th June we have a weekend work party planned finishing the slipway at Crews Pitch and working on the brickwork beneath Skew Bridge. There are a few other small jobs to be done there time and labour

force allowing.

A week work is planned for July (21st - 29th) when we intend dredging to full navigation depth and with the whole length from the main Worcester road to Middle Court bridge at Monkhide. Also to complete the brickwork beneath Skew bridge. Ready for our trip boat next year?

We would like to see more new faces at our work parties. I have been arranging new sites for us to work on and the Waterway recovery groupsare very keen to give their services

towards our project.





COMMITTEE MATTERS

In the last Wharfinger we started a new column to keep you better informed about our Committee meetings. Here are details of some of the main issues reported to:-

MARCH COMMITTEE

- * London Waterway Recovery Group had undertaken some 290 "person hours" (there were ladies present!) of voluntary work over the weekend of the 23/25th February. A section of hedge was laid to the west of the A4103; further brush (and limited tree) clearance was undertaken on the same section of canal, and stop planks were inserted after much hand excavation of mud under Middle Court Bridge.
- * Arrangements for the Easter work Camp were discussed to be at Newent, on land owned by Mr. Robin Styles, involving preliminary clearance work in the vicinity of the locks. It was considered important that we commenced restoration work in Gloucestershire and neighbouring land owners were also very interested.
- * There was a discussion about the need for small signs to remind walkers that the majority of our work sites remained private land and there was, therefore, no automatic public right of access.
- * It was agreed that the Canal Society should formally object to the proposed new trunk road (A40 Longford to M50 Gorsley Improvement between Newent and Gloucester) as there was no provision made for the Canal where the new road crosses it. This was considered essential to "reserve our position" pending discussions with the Department of Transport.
- * The Canal Society had arranged for a display in the Hereford City Library for 3 weeks in August prior to the National Waterways Festival.

APRIL COMMITTEE

- * Hereford and Worcester County Council had agreed to erect an official "no dumping" sign at Middle Court Bridge (at no cost to the Canal Society) to try and reduce the "fly tipping" that had increased recently both on the Canal towpath and the adjacent "green lane".
- * Arrangements were already in hand for the major Summer Work Camp on the section between Middle Court Bridge and the Skew Bridge, from the 20th to 29th July; it would include dredging, towpath levelling, landscaping and brickwork repairs. The National Rivers Authority (Welsh Region) had given WRG a £750 grant towards the costs of this work.
- * The special sub-committee established to plan our major display for the National Waterways Festival [to be held at Gloucester Docks over the August Bank Holiday] was meeting monthly although a great deal of work was involved good progress was being made. The Hereford branch of Messrs Jewsons were making available materials for our display panels at a very substantial discount. The first of these panels would be on display at the AGM.
- * The National Rivers Authority (Welsh Region) had given the Canal Society a conditional grant of £1,000 towards the costs of a detailed professional engineering feasibility study, of the prospects of restoring the section of Canal from the crossing of the River Lugg right into Hereford City this followed on from the free study that had been undertaken by the Consulting Engineers Messrs John Burrow and Partners (as reported on pages 15/16 of the previous issue of Wharfinger). It was decided to defer this detailed study until there was a better indication of how our approach to the County Council had been received regarding the provision of a bridge for the Canal as part of the Roman Road improvement scheme.

COMMITTEE MATTERS ...(iii)

* Arrangements had been made that future Committee meetings would be held at Yarkhill Village Hall so that we had a permanent base for such meetings.

MAY COMMITTEE

- * Following his election as Chairman Cliff Penny expressed thanks to Tony Austin- Bailey (the retiring Chairman) and to our long serving Treasurer James Dunn (who had also stood down). Both would be continuing to serve on the Committee.
- * The papers relating to the formation of a Charitable Trust were then discussed. Unfortunately the list of "Subscribers to the Memorandum of Association" that had been completed by some of our Members at the recent AGM was technically invalid as some had only printed their name and address and had not signed it. Attempts had been made to get the missing signatures but one had eluded us. As it was considered essential to get the papers to the IWA as soon as possible (in the hope that the Society could be a Charitable Trust in time for the National Waterways Festival) a new list of "Subscribers" was drawn up.
- * A letter from the County Engineer and Planning Officer was reported regarding the Roman Road Bridge. It was agreed that further advice should be obtained from the Inland Waterways Association and that an informal meeting should then be requested in order that this important matter could be progressed. Further details soon.
- * It was decided that each Member of the Committee should be persuaded to hold a specific post (or two!) in an effort to spread our increasing workload and make it easier for people to know who dealt with what. Details appear elsewhere in this issue and are subject to change as we review our progress.

COMMITTEE MATTERS...(iv)

- * Laurie Lavender reported on a number of successful meetings with land owners regarding potential new sites for restoration/conservation work. It was stressed, however, that we intended to concentrate on our existing sites first with the completion of the length from Middle Court Bridge to the A4103 as our top priority. The National Rivers Authority (Welsh Region) had asked for a three year programme to be drawn up.
- * Land and Leisure: Tir A Hamdden (one of the Welsh Water plc group of Companies) have agreed to sponsor all of our printing for the financial year 1990/91. [This is why this copy of Wharfinger is slightly more legible than in the past!] Apart from Wharfinger the arrangement includes many thousands of copies of a number of promotional leaflets these will be available shortly before the National Waterways Festival; eventually each paid up Member will receive a set.
- * Hereford and Worcester County Council have invited the Canal Society to be involved in the preparation of a ten year "County Countryside Recreational Strategy" document. Cliff Penny tabled a draft of his suggested comprehensive response more details in the next issue.
- * The Canal Society has obtained a 30% grant, towards the cost of small tools, jointly from the Countryside Commission and Hereford and Worcester County Council. Hereford Industrial Supply Company have supplied the tools at a greater than normal discount. The total grant is £125.
- * It was agreed that we should arrange a small display, promoting the work of the Canal Society, as part of the Dymock Festival of Transport on Sunday 24th June WHY NOT COME AND SUPPORT US?

IT CAN'T BE DONE

To those who say to our long-term objective, of (once more) linking the City of Hereford, via 34 miles of canal to the national inland waterways network at Gloucester - "it can't be done", we point to the Kennet and Avon Canal - where similar words were spoken 15 to 20 years ago - to be re-opened by Her Majesty the Queen this August.

There are many other restoration schemes around the Country where hard working volunteers are "doing the impossible" and restoring canals, overcoming all sorts of problems, providing an important leisure facility (and a living museum of our industrial heritage) that will be enjoyed for generations to come.

200 years ago, men of vision, with very limited financial and physical resources built the Canal; with modern day resources we have the opportunity to conserve, restore, replace the Canal... it's amazing what can be done if you believe in it, if you enlist the help of others. The easiest option is to give up, BUT it is amazing what can be achieved - with a little help - if you try!

HARD HATS

Recently introduced safety regulations REQUIRE that approved safety helmets are worn AT ALL TIMES when on building and construction sites. There are a few exceptions - none of which are likely to apply to our work. SO, in future, no matter what you are doing - even just watching - even if you are there "just for a quick look" - if you are actually on one of our restoration sites THE LAW REQUIRES THAT YOU WEAR AN APPROVED SAFETY HELMET AT ALL TIMES.



We have thanks to Tony plus efforts from others in our group received a number of grants and donations


towards our restoration programme.
