A great deal has happened since the last edition of The Wharfinger dropped on to your mat! Thankfully, almost all of these "happenings" have been good for the Canal Trust and there is one common theme to all of them - the results arise from hours of work by unpaid volunteers; in many instances our unseen hard workers "behind the scenes".

NATIONAL AWARD FOR TRUST

For the second time in four years we have won the British Marine Industries Trophy for the best display by a voluntary group at the National Waterways Festival (the award was only introduced four Well done to all years ago). concerned - those who updated our display panels, store and organise goods. transported sales everything to Henley on Thames (a marvellous site from which to promote our activities) and erected the display, those who "manned the stand"; and those who took it all down and brought it all back safely home. Each element of this teamwork was essential to our success thank you.

ANOTHER PLANNING SUCCESS

Just as this issue was going to press we heard the good news that yet another Planning Inspector had found in favour of the Canal Trust and refused to grant Planning Permission, on Appeal, for a site at Withington in Herefordshire. The site in question had received a Permission, a number of years ago (before the supportive Local Plan Policies were in place) but the development did not proceed. South Herefordshire District Council refused a "renewal" Application on

the site and this was taken to Appeal. We argued that the current "protective" Policies now had to be taken into account - in respect of the main line of the Canal and the off-line Basin at Withington - and the Inspector agreed. One of three reasons for his outright refusal was "... the proposed development ... would prevent the Council from safeguarding the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal." The Canal Trust have made it clear to the owner of the land that we are not opposed to development on the site provided it respects the line of the Canal (and the Basin) and have offered to work together to develop suitable proposals.

YET MORE PLANNING ISSUES

As we go to press we have yet another Planning Inquiry; this time in respect of the site of the former Over Hospital in Gloucestershire. the very positive Regrettably. recommendations of Tewkesbury Borough Council Planners [see p. 3 of the last edition] were overturned by Councillors who voted to refuse the sensitive housing development planned for this site - possibly losing the opportunity to get the Canal restored as part of the development. Subject to conclusion of an Agreement we were in the (unusual) position of supporting a developer at an Appeal! [see p.4]

Meanwhile, the Worcester family firm Messrs Underwoods have resubmitted their development proposals on the former Pritchard's Metals site in Hereford [See report on the very favourable Appeal decision, in strong favour of the Canal Trust, in edition 53 - pages 19-21.]. Most regrettably, the revised

layout takes no notice of the Inspector's findings. A detailed outright objection has been made by the Canal Trust. A further letter has been written to Mr Underwood repeating our (previously ignored) offer to work with them to produce a viable layout for the site (we have presented a layout to Hereford City Council that leads to no loss of the now proposed floor space provided the developer funds a short length of retaining wall).

Also in Herefordshire, we are about to meet with the Environment Agency, jointly with the City Council and the developer of a key site in the City [see pages4/5 of the last edition], to try and overcome some misunderstandings that have led to the Environment Agency objecting to the developer's proposals for the new length of Canal within his development.

FOR SALE!

A length of former railway siding in Hereford has been placed on the market by Rail Property Limited and will be auctioned in Bristol at the end of October. This narrow strip of land forms the essential diversion route for the Canal around the Painter Brothers Factory: the diversion route was lodged with Hereford City Council in 1991 and has been successfully protected development in intervening years. We have acted swiftly to point out to the Solicitors handling the sale that development on this land would be subject to an outright objection by the Canal Trust and we would expect the Hereford City Council and the Planning Inspectorate to be consistent in their support for the protection of the Canal route if any such proposals were taken to Appeal. Hereford City Council Planning Department have sent a very clearly worded letter supporting this view to Rail Property Limited; regrettably the latter have refused to withdraw the land from the auction. However, they have included in the sales particulars the letters from both the Canal Trust, and the Council, detailing the situation at this site.

OXENHALL

Just in case you think it is all paperwork (although, by the time you add all of the efforts by our Treasurer, Membership Secretary and others to the above it feels like it is at times!) our own volunteers. together with those from all over the country working under the national "Dig Deep" initiative, are making splendid progress Oxenhall. Brian Fox will bring you up to date in his regular report fon page 16]. But these (very) regular work parties do not just happen, there is a great deal of hard work "behind the scenes" in arranging budgets, materials, accommodation, permissions and in the essential liaison with the Waterway Recovery Group and Dig Deep organisers. Another "thank you" to those who can so easily be taken for granted.

CRAFT SUCCESS

The end of October saw the first of our 1997 Craft Fairs. The St Catherine's Hall, in Ledbury, featured an extensive display of our restoration work plus a diverse range of craft stalls - including our own sales stand and home-made refreshments. Our thanks to all who

Committee Matters

Three Council of Management meetings are reviewed by our Editor in order that our Members and supporters are kept up to date . . .

JULY COMMITTEE

- Thanks were expressed to all concerned regarding the highly successful erection of our "Bailey" Bridge at Oxenhall [see photographs in the last edition of The Wharfinger.
- Restoration Group's arrangements for the Waterway Recovery Group's summer Canal were discussed endorsed freport in Restoration Update - p.16].
- Scaffolding would required in order to finish the brickwork on the Oxenhall Tunnel Portal and, subsequently, for work at House Lock. There was an extensive debate about safety/certification issues and merits regarding purchase of our own scaffolding compared to hiring.
- Progress at Lock Cottage/the overflow weir was reported together with detailed report from the Special Projects Group who continue to manage all work in this area. Concern was expressed at the exceedingly poor standard of brickwork that had been laid by a visiting volunteer group when repairing a towpath wall. It was agreed that it would inspected by our own bricklaver and that, in future, any such work would be stopped at an early stage and the volunteers taught how to achieve an acceptable standard. If they were not willing (or able) to do

- so they would be asked to undertake less skilled work. Steps were in hand to overcome concern regarding maintenance of the grass on the towpath in Gloucestershire.
- There had been publicity for our work on BBC Radio Gloucester and regular positive articles had appeared in the Gloucester Citizen.
- The Trading Company reported that they were having problems with the donated van; serious engine problems meant that hire vehicles were once again having to be used [greatly cutting into funds -Ed.].
- There was a detailed report on the very significant development activity at various sites in both counties which was causing extensive work for our voluntary Planning Liaison team.
- Discussions were taking place with a landowner in order to regularise an abstraction of water from the Canal into a nearby lake. It was agreed that, in principle, genuine surplus water could be made available subject to the comments of the Environment Agency and our Honorary Solicitor; a formal Agreement would be required.

AUGUST COMMITTEE

 Bryan Heatley was in liaison with our existing two Vice Presidents, and Viscount Portman, regarding their roles. He reported that he had been nominated by the Transport Trust (of which he is also Chairman) as the national inland waterways contact. He was pursuing the potential for organising a study day, based on the Canal, next Spring. The posts of Trust Administrator and a Manager for the Trading Company were still without volunteers [and we still don't have a Press & Publicity Officer - Ed.]. Various options were to be pursued.

Budgets were approved for the third quarter. Although funds were exceedingly limited it was decided to take the once opportunity only purchasing the "launch nose"

for the "Bailey Bridge" rather than return it to the suppliers.

- In view of the continuing importance of the Special Projects Group it was agreed there should that representative serving as member of the Council of Management.
- Following very detailed discussion it was resolved that Oxenhall Lock Cottage would not be sold until next Spring [As reported in the last edition.]
- Discussions had taken place with Gloucestershire County Council regarding the partial collapse of material onto towpath adjacent Coldharbour Lane Bridge at Oxenhall.

- Further reports received with regard to the many development sites where negotiations were continuing/ Appeals were in progress.
- Mike Potts reported a profit of over £200 from the weekend tour to Manchester, and of nearly £90 from the Teddy Bears Picnic on the Mon. and Brec. Canal. Regrettably, due to lack of bookings, the proposed trip to Ellesmere Port might have to be cancelled.
- Sonia Rolt was likely to be our guest speaker for the November Social evening [other Social details on p. 10.]
- Obtaining the correct lime for the restoration of the Lock was incurring substantial costs. [However, Council of Management agreed that there was only one way to do the work - the correct way - Ed.]
- Concern was expressed at the management of visiting volunteers with regard standards of work on the listed structure of House Lock. It was agreed that, in order to make best use of the stone that was being recovered from the former railway abutment, and to assist maintaining standards/ teaching our own and visiting volunteers, the Trust would pay for a local stone mason to be on site when required. Following a report from our own bricklayer the defective towpath wall had been demolished and would be rebuilt; a suggestion that it could remain as it would be out of sight below eventual water level was firmly rejected.

SEPTEMBER COMMITTEE

- · Due to continued heavy commitments on other matters it had not been possible for the Chairman to visit Oxenhall during the August WRG Canal Camp. The Hereford Volunteer Bureau had been contacted to try to fill some of our vacancies.
- Mike and Joyce Potts were continuing to give talks to external organisations - nine were in hand over the next few months. The Council Management thanked them for their continuing efforts spread the word about voluntary work.
- The Treasurer reported exceedingly heavy outgoings due to materials and other expenditure at Oxenhall. Other budgets were having to reduced to allow work continue.
- Arrangements for Volunteers Christmas Party and the Canal Trust Christmas Dinner were reported and welcomed [see pages 3 & 23].
- · The attendance at the National Waterways Festival, at Henley, had been a major success in terms of promotion of our work and sales - and the Trust had won the BMIF Trophy as well! [See page 1.]
- The means by which Oxenhall Lock Cottage would be sold was discussed at length; the final decision was based on detailed recommendations from a respected local Estate Agent. [Details on page 22].



RESTORATION UPDATE

Restoration at Oxenhall is now going ahead at a frantic pace. For a week in August the WRG volunteers descended on us in numbers, 25 at one time, ladies and gents of varying age groups, and all managed to squeeze into Dymock Village Hall to sleep on the floor. Most seemed to cope with the arrangement very well although I did see the odd one having forty winks after lunch. Many of them were students looking for a useful pastime during their holidays and some were involved Duke in of Edinburgh award schemes. They came from all over the country, even one from Italy, and apparently made a very good team considering they had never met before. They certainly made a noticeable impression on the lock, which is the long term Dig Deep project, and according to the visitors book which we have now started they were favourably mostly impressed with the countryside and perhaps, most of all, the social side of the week.

With the assistance of a few local volunteers the first task was to strip all the loose stone and brick from the upper wing walls at the entrance to the lock and get down to a surface which was solid enough to key our reconstructed lock into. This included moving a few stones weighing upwards of 5 cwt and some large tree roots which had grown into the lock walls - luckily a JCB had been hired for the weekend and the task was made relatively easy.

Those stones which were still roughly in situ were numbered and noted on the master plan so that they could be put back in the correct position. We discovered that the bricks used in the lock walls mixed in with the stone were of a different size to the standard brick generally used 200 years ago and more were needed before rebuilding operations could commence. After three days the demolition was complete and we were ready to start putting it all back together again, a bit like doing a jig-saw with half the bits missing!

The lock is a Grade II Listed structure and everything has to be rebuilt as near to the original specifications as possible. Lime had been used instead of cement mortar in 1795 and it was clear that

expert advice was needed before commenced because we were unsure of the correct mix. special lime that we

required was only locally available from a firm in Brecon and the bricks from a firm near Ludlow. Simon Hayward once again made his truck available for the collection and Steve Delacourt spent a day driving around finally arriving back at Oxenhall late on the Tuesday. Another challenge successfully overcome but the budget severely depleted on materials costing more than anticipated.

There were plenty of other tasks to hand so a start was made on the lower wing walls which were of a totally different construction. One side being of rough stone in the

form of a retaining wall bonded together with puddle clay whilst the other side was built of the same rough stone but keyed into a rubble and lime mortar backing. Both need rebuilding as the clay had been washed from one wall over the years and many stones were loose or missing, whilst the other wall had totally collapsed.

Another job was the clearance of an old overflow culvert, about 18" in diameter (linking this canal with the coal branch) which had become totally blocked with tree roots and this was tackled with relish by one of the students who happened to be a potholer.

By the end of the week we were making considerable progress although not exactly where we had There planned. was stone everywhere, some from the dismantled lock and an growing supply from the railway abutment which was also being demolished. Neat rows lined the towpath for about 30 yards in either direction, care being taken to leave sufficient room for public access along the towpath and also for conveyance of sand and gravel by wheelbarrow from Church Lane, which was the nearest access point for large lorries.

Since August we have had the pleasure of WRG company again on 4 separate weekends with the final effort for this year being on October 11th/12th. We have now resolved the mortar mix problem (sorry challenge) and collected a second load of special bricks! Thanks to another of our members, John Arnold, who loaned his truck. Stone has been re-laid and some recut (after being transported

specialist stone cutting firm in the Forest of Dean) whilst we are employing a stonemason to give us expert guidance on that aspect of the job and to complete some final dressing of the stone. Our objective is to complete the upper wing walls of the lock this year, put in some temporary stop planks so that the water is diverted over the newly restored spillweir, remove the earth dam, and fill the pound with water to its full depth. Each day we work seems to bring new challenges as we strive to complete our jig-saw but they will be overcome and we shall then be forced to sit back and relax for a while or the Trust will be broke. Restoration of a listed structure doesn't come cheap!

There has been no mention of the weather this summer because there has been nothing exceptional to report, until last Saturday (Oct 11th) when it poured all day and posed a few challenges. The WRGies coped, mixing a bit of concrete, and laying a few stones but finally giving in by mid afternoon (even they have limits) to go and get some dry clothes on. The local volunteers had planned to clear out the bottom pound above the aqueduct but after a few runs along the towpath realised it was not such a good idea when a dumper nearly slid over the bank. Sunday was sunny but still too wet along the path so dumpers transferred surplus soil from our compound to a local field while spare bodies were employed in erecting gateposts to complete the of "our" security part Gloucestershire County Council's Depot. By the time you read this we should be securely fenced in and able to work on plant protected from the elements by our own mobile workshop (framed tent!).

Before I go any further it should be made clear that the work at Oxenhall is not exclusively done by WRG. A lot of credit must go to our own dedicated band of workers who keep the momentum going on other weekends and even during the week. Most of the credit for the brickwork is due to Dave Young, our own retired bricklayer who, together with a few more of us active retirees, enjoys nothing better than a day at Oxenhall listening to the birds twittering, trickling water and the scrape of a trowel on brick. Dave has been with us for some years having been responsible for much of the brickwork at the tunnel portal and leggers rest and is keen to see things progress. He has volunteered to lead a small party of folk with time to spare during the week on continuing work on the lock and also maintenance of the whole of the length from the tunnel to the aqueduct. This would involve grass cutting, strimming, trimming of hedges and generally keeping this delightful stretch of canal and towpath tidy. Local people walking the footpath clearly take great pleasure from what we are doing so any who feel they can spare an hour or two from time to time would be more than welcome - just call Dave or me (numbers below).

We continue our review of the earlier Editions of The Wharfinger. [Editions 1-42 were covered in Editions 50,51,54 & 55.]

Edition 43 (Summer 1994) saw the Chairman reflecting on the immense progress that had been made in the last 10 years in gaining political support for our long term objective of restoration. "Yes I know that many of you reading this would like to see greater progress on the ground but a fat lot of good that is if we then find lack of attention to policy detail has lead to the total loss of the historic line (or an essential diversion a fat lot of good route) somewhere along that is if we then the 34 miles ... Our voluntary endeavours find lack of will become permanent asset to the attention...has community and the lead to the total national water ways network." he said. The loss of the...line same edition reported, in detail, the greatly improved wording for the Forest of Dean Local Plan. Good progress was also reported with other Local Waterways World (August 1994 Edition) contained a detailed article about the Canal with four colour pages of photographs. Heart of England Tourist Board had identified the Canal as a major asset to tourism in Hereford City. David book about the Canal had been republished in an extended and revised edition.

The Directors' of the Canal Trust had (according to the Autumn 1994 - Edition 44) been

reviewing the running of the Canal Trust and the Trading The . Company. role of Chairman was to change. The Canal Trust had won the BMIF award at the National Waterways Festival for the best display by a voluntary group on the first occasion that it was presented [and again this year - see p.1 -Ed.1 The Planning Inspector appointed to decide an Appeal for a proposed permanent Gypsy encampment on the line of the Canal at Rudford. Gloucestershire, had firmly rejected the proposals

including a last minute suggestion that it might be approved on a temporary basis.

The Winter of 1994/5 (Edition 45) reported that the first formal Landowner Agreement had been signed in respect of a length of Canal in Herefordshire owned by Mrs. Oram

this set out the basis of our occupation of the Canal until the year 2040. There was to be a three day Open Day at Monkhide the following year to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the first boat arriving in Hereford City Basin. The Canal Trust were continuing to press Forest of Dean District Council to take action to secure the repair of Lock Cottage at Oxenhall. Significant progress on Yarkhill Project Site (the section owned by Mrs. Oram) was reported with both of our excavators in action over a very successful September Camp.

Consultants Reports covering the whole Canal, encompassing Engineering, Water Resources, some limited Environmental Assessments and a detailed Cost Special Analysis. A Projects Group had also been formed within the Canal Trust to oversee work in Gloucestershire.

combined Edition 50. the Spring/Summer edition for 1996, saw the introduction of our vastly improved front (and back!) cover to The Wharfinger. Cliff Penny wrote his last column as Chairman, that the Canal stressed was already helping to support the economy long before restoration was completed! He explained why it was absolutely essential commission the independent Consulting Engineers Reports these would provide the firm foundations on which to base competent Lottery and other major funding bids. Forest of Dean District Council structural commissioned survey of Lock Cottage, House Lock and the Aqueduct at Oxenhall. A special meeting of the Canal Trust Council of Management was to consider these Reports and seek a way forward. Yet again, our Canal Camp had produced heavy rain and the photographs indicated a somewhat muddy site! 
