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EDITORIAL



HEREFORD'S NEW CANAL BASIN

Early in July Herefordshire Council's Cabinet considered the preliminary report of the team of Consultants who are undertaking the £250,000 study that is identifying options for the redevelopment of some 100acres of Hereford City - the Edgar Street Grid. A 'once in a lifetime' opportunity to plan how the area should be redeveloped over the coming years.

The approach is intended to present a co-ordinated proposal for incorporation within the Unitary Development Plan to ensure that, as individual areas within this part of the City come forward for redevelopment, they form a part of the ultimate picture. In order to be successful it is essential to 'masterplan' the area as a whole to ensure that the necessary infrastructure is in place and that the correct overall balance is achieved - including financial viability. A key part of any proposals had to be the integration of the area into the existing City Centre; only a short walk away but with a busy 'ring road' between. Also, there are existing facilities (such as the Courtvard Theatre/Arts Centre and Hereford United Football Ground) which are difficult to reach on foot from the City.

Our Canal Trust (represented by Penny Environmental & Planning/David Penny) has been involved from the outset in a Focus Group with the Consultants. The Group comprised about a dozen people including, as well as the H&GCT, representatives of the Hereford City Partnership, Courtyard Theatre, Chamber

of Commerce, Civic Trust, Hereford United Football Club, Police, College of Art and Design etc.

A new Canal Basin, forming the heart of one of the quadrants within the 'Grid', is proposed in all of the various options that were put to the Council's Cabinet in July.

One of these options has now been approved for further work by the Consultants and David will continue to liaise as more detail is added to the initial 'broad brush' plans. This builds on the long-term 'behind the scenes' liaison that has been ongoing for many years in respect of Hereford City with both Senior Officers and Members of the Council (and its predecessor). For example, as long ago as 1991 the essential deviations from the historic route of the Canal were agreed in order that a viable route, right back into the heart of the City, could be achieved.

Also in July, Herefordshire Council approved, in principle, a 14 dwelling proposal by Harper Group Construction Limited on the edge of the Edgar Street Grid area. This approval was subject to a formal Agreement to transfer the line of the Canal through the site to the H&GCT and the payment by the future householders, in perpetuity, of a maintenance and management sum in respect of the Canal. Once again this site has been the subject of much discussion and negotiation prior to this stage and

we greatly appreciate the cooperation of Harpers, and the Council, which has enabled the very recent 'in principle' approval.

The outline for the whole future of this part of Hereford should become clear over the coming months. There is still a lot of hard work to be done to turn the 'broad brush' vision into reality. Working together we know that it can be done, and that the Canal will be a very significant asset to the City. Your Council of Management is determined to continue to work with Herefordshire Council, their Consultants, and other relevant interested parties to deliver a successful outcome.


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
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SOUTH WEST CANAL SOCIETIES DAY

THE NATIONAL WATERWAYS MUSEUM

The National Waterways Museum was opened in 1988. It is housed in and around Llanthony Warehouse, a listed building constructed in historic Gloucester Docks in 1873. The Museum is owned by The Waterways Trust, a Charitable Trust established in 1999 to ensure that our waterways resources are supported, valued and enjoyed by all sections of the community.

The theme of the Museum is the story of how Britain's network of waterways was created, and explores the lives of those who lived and worked on them. The collection is designated as being of national importance.

In addition to the historic artefacts there are touch-screen computers and other interactive displays, and also various family activities, which change throughout the year. Visitors can make use of the café and shop and can enjoy a 45-minute boat trip along the Gloucester and Sharpness Canal (from Easter to October) on board 'Queen Boadicea II', one of the 'little ships' of Dunkirk.

PROGRESS AT OXENHALL



We have also been working on a new site, at the old Newent Station, made available by Gloucestershire County Council [see page 29 of Ed 75]. The priority on the site has been the erection of a substantial fence to keep out fly tippers. Our friends within the Waterway Recovery Group had a planned restoration weekend on another canal that was cancelled at the last minute so they contacted us in anticipation that we would put their voluntary efforts to good use. We didn't let them down! Within hours it was arranged that they would come to Newent to work with us to erect the fence. Their mini-excavator 'Blue' was used to dig the post holes and conduct some trial excavations on the site of the old Newent station which is included within our fenced off area. Apparently it was deemed to be an historic occasion being the first where a railway station



platform is being converted into a canal wharf! I mustn't forget to mention and thank our colleagues from Over who had an 'away day' to finish erection of the fence during the following weekends – especially Henry Clark and Russ, who came with welding kit!

The 'new' fence will be given a coat of paint, which fits in well with the proposed work plan for David and Elizabeth now that they have finished painting the 'bailey' bridge. As a bonus for a job well done they were given a week off to go to Scotland on Mike and Joyce's coach trip - but they will surely now be waiting for another job? We cannot afford to let volunteers go once we have got them!



We are used to the idea of timing our site work so that we don't disturb birds during the nesting season but this year the bird population at Over presented us with an extra challenge. A pair of blue tits nested inside the door of Tony's tool store. When I say inside the door I literally mean that. They

nested between the two skins of the door so each time we opened the door their nest rotated 90° or so – but they seemed quite happy!

Not to be outdone, about 10 yards away a pair of great tits chose the exhaust of WRG's red pump as their home for the 2003 season.

Henry and Russ felled several large dead trees for us but one particularly big one required a specialist. Working with a chain saw on the ground is one thing; aerial work is quite another requiring an additional qualification and experience. Adrian Hope came to our rescue, felling



Then came an evening visit from the City of Gloucester Branch of the CPRE -The Campaign to Protect Rural **England.** They were impressed with the work done so far and particularly interested in our re-cycling of construction materials. Our work certainly supports their objectives to "promote the

beauty, tranquility and diversity of rural England by encouraging the sustainable use of land and other natural resources."

The water level in the Basin dropped considerably from evaporation since it was last topped up about a year ago. We are very grateful to **Andrew Sykes Hire Ltd** for lending us a pump that brought the level up in double-quick time.

Meanwhile we have been doing some work – honestly! At this time of year a lot of effort goes into grass cutting and strimming and keeping the plants and trees watered. Planting of various osiers has continued, and to stop damage to the young trees (which is probably being caused by rabbits or deer) we've erected about 50 metres of chestnut paling fence kindly donated by residents at Stauntons Hill. We've also carried out a range of maintenance jobs on our trip boat, Mister Maysey, and 'Arty' has provided her (him?) with smart new H&G CT signs.

Our DoE group swelled briefly to 13 as youngsters joined us to do the Service element of their Award – see their article on page 15.

Progress on the car park has continued with the building of the retaining wall in 'Bay One'. Most recently, a concentrated effort over one weekend has seen the planings brought up to full height over most of the car park and then rolled. This has left the surface looking very neat. Weeding of all the fingers between the bays has completed the smartening effect.

Various volunteers have scratched their heads and exchanged words of wisdom in attempts to get one of our bird-free pumps working. On an extremely hot Saturday morning, after cranking the engine literally hundreds of times and failing to get it to fire even once, somebody made the throwaway remark "Sometimes these have to be cranked anti-clockwise". Simple, really.

RESTORATION fund



This years Restoration Fund has provided a car park at Over Basin.

Our ultimate aim is to recreate the canal between the two cities, providing new opportunities for walkers, cyclists, boaters and all lovers of the countryside, as well as boosting tourist income along the route.

Over the next few years we have very ambitious plans for restoration which will require money as well as volunteers' time. Currently we are dependent on income from Trust membership and donations and from fundraising events. We are seeking grant funding but the uncertainty of successfully winning specific bids makes budgeting and planning extremely difficult.

We invite members and supporters to contribute a small, regular payment each month which will help finance specific projects.

How it works:

- Contributors pay a minimum of £3 per month by Standing Order. Gift Aid can enhance this at no cost to the contributor
- Annually, The Wharfinger will report how the money has been spent
- Annually, we will invite contributors to an exclusive social event at an H&G restoration venue that has progressed during the previous year for a talk and/or tour and a buffet meal.

By the time you read this the ground floor block walls and the brick pillars and arches will be complete. The brickwork uses reclaimed bricks from the original Lock Cottage that stood on the same site.

Electrical circuits and fire alarm systems are being planned and their installation has started. A close circuit television system is now operating and we are able to record movement around the building. The first of the wood block flooring from the original Over Hospital has now come out of our off-site storage and a device is being designed by Tony to clean and tidy them ready for laying on the ground floor.

Outside, the front of TWH is being landscaped; top soil and horse manure have been brought and spread ready for the autumn planting, and work has started on the brick paving to the annexe.



A series of 'Weekend Work-ins' have been arranged over the next few months. The idea behind this is to concentrate the work over a two-day period. This should improve our workflow on specific projects. Just to make the whole thing 'go with a swing', Liz Bailey has offered to make us all lunch. The dates of the first Weekend Work-ins are: –

We hope to be plaster boarding; studwalling; electrics; plumbing; plastering; wood block flooring; laying paving and landscaping outside etc.



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
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The 6th August saw a further step in the new bypass for Gloucester - and the donation of a major asset to the Trust.

The former pedestrian bridge over the Hempsted Branch line was in the way of the bypass and some time ago we asked if we could have the structure when it was demolished. It always pays to ask as the eventual answer was yes! So on 6th August Midwinter Transport yet again came to

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

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


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
The Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 but was not completed until 1845, making this the last major route built in Britain, but for the navigations of Birmingham and the Manchester Ship Canal. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, utilising some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. the Canal was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed by Dr Beeching in 1964.

The Canal Society was formed in 1983 and replaced in 1992 by Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity. The Trust has an ordinary and corporate membership exceeding 1,100 from all over the country and abroad! Our objective is to fully restore the 34 mile Canal, from its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network at Gloucester to the centre of Hereford. A Steering Committee of Local Authorities, etc. has been formed by the Trust to assist in progressing this objective. We have a major restoration site in each county, which together extend to some 3.5 miles.

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


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
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
