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
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# THE CHAIRMAN'S COLUMN





Fifteen years ago, when I first stood around on the Canal Society's stand hoping no one would ask me any questions, I'm sure most people visiting us thought we were a bunch of well-intentioned but outrageously optimistic nutters. The very idea of restoring a canal, so derelict that it was largely invisible and almost totally forgotten, seemed completely whacky. Many people looked at our displays and listened kindly to us and some even asked "Do you ever think you'll do this?" Probably most thought it was a good idea – if we could do it.

How different it is today! This summer the Herefordshire Council published its proposals for the redevelopment of the City with the vision of a new canal basin, not tucked away in a corner using land no one else wanted, but as the central focus of the most significant development in the City for many years. Elsewhere along the line of the Canal, where some other major attractions have been lost, there is great enthusiasm for the canal which will bring colourful boats and bustling activity. The question we have been asked most often this Summer has been, simply "When?"

The journey from 'if' to 'when' has been a long one and we are still a long way from giving you an answer to the latter, but there is now little doubt that one day we shall succeed. The significance of the developments in Hereford is that it provides the raison d'etre for the rest of the line. The Council has made it very clear that it wants to see boats in its new basin. Boats coming and going, carrying people here and there. It wants to see people fishing in the canal and walking along the towpath – simply enjoying themselves.

So how can we make it happen sooner, rather than later? The major funding that has been forthcoming elsewhere for the past few years may well not last for ever, and with many competing projects we will have to fight our corner. We may need to think differently about the way ahead and come up with some new ideas and radical approaches. Maybe "Who dares, wins" might be a good counsel. Now where have I heard that before?

# RIVER CANAL RESCUE/CANAL AND RIVERBOAT AWARD

The Spring edition of **The Wharfinger** included our occasional Corporate Spotlight item featuring, on that occasion, River Canal Rescue. This included details of their new annual Award (with Canal & Riverboat magazine) that recognises the valuable contributions of individuals to waterways restoration. Last year the award was made to actor David Suchet. This year the late Brian Moult – our former Trading Company Chairman – was voted to receive the award. As regular readers will know, Brian's Wife Janet is now Chairman of the Trading Company and she writes:-

Thank you to every one who voted for Brian to receive this national Award. It was a very great honour to receive it on his behalf at The National Waterways Festival. It had been a very close run thing so two awards were made to Brian and to John Craven. Becca and I continue to be supported by the canal community, locally and by those we have met over the years – they are a great bunch of people.

Part of the Award was a year's 'Gold Membership' of RCR – 24 hour 365 day breakdown cover for a nominated boat – worth £155. As Janet does not have a boat she wanted to ensure that this went to a good cause. Our friends at the Worcester and Birmingham Canal Society (who are Corporate Members of the H&GCT) very successfully operate a narrowboat 'Cecilia' that gives waterways holidays to the less able, and other deserving individuals/families. Like everything we do, theirs is a wholly voluntary venture. W&BCS Vice Chairman (and 'Cecilia' Co-ordinator), David Wheeler, said "It never ceases to amaze me at the generosity of some people – I have spoken to Janet to thank her for her very kind gesture".

# AYLESTONE PARK CANAL PROJECT

Just as we went to press we had the fantastic news that the Aylestone Park Association had secured a £100,000 grant towards the restoration of the Canal and other works. We are very grateful for all the voluntary time that Council Parks Officer, Fran White, has put in to help secure this – *Thank you*. This in addition to the more than £30,000 already pledged by Herefordshire Council.

This money will fund the restoration of the Canal on the edge of the Park; the creation of 2,5km of footpaths and cycleways around the Park and linking the Canal out into the local community – including about one third of the route to eventually take people over the tunnel if they don't want to walk/cycle through it! It will also contribute towards the costs of building a new foot/cycle bridge over the Canal linking the Park to Staniers Way/Roman Road; extensive tree planting and conservation works; fence removal and replacement; the construction of two view points and interpretative signage – an extensive package of works on a very large site.

Thanks to a last minute request from Essex WRG for some work, they spent a weekend removing a substantial fence which had been erected along the towpath some years ago. This gave us a further 50 metres of walkable towpath, and most of the initial clearance of the Canal completed.

By the time you read this Brian Fox will be starting to gather together the local team of volunteers. The first task will be tree planting over the last weekend of November/first weekend of December with Herefordshire Council/the local community. The team will then spend the winter months completing the preparation to permit the major works to commence early next year.



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
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# RESTORATION

at Oxenhall and Newent

## OXENHALL

The section from the tunnel to the aqueduct.

What a difference a month makes. Traditionally we have held the annual Oxenhall Open Day in October and it has always rained at some point during the day. This year it was brought forward by a month and the sun shone all day making this delightful part of Gloucestershire look even more attractive than normal.

I hope that those who came to see us were impressed with the progress on the lock and also the considerable changes which are currently being undertaken along this whole stretch of canal. Not only have the Wrinklies achieved remarkable progress on the lock over the last few months but Tom Bennett has been at work with his large excavator and the WRGies descended on us for a weekend.

Starting at the top end of the Oxenhall section, the path up to the Tunnel was cleared on the Tuesday before the Open





Day with sterling work being done by a brush cutter in the hands of Dave Jones and John Forrest while the rest of the team followed up laying all the cuttings on the wet surface to aid those walkers who haven't been able to get to the tunnel so far this year. The wettest parts were either built up with extra soil or pallets laid over so that it is now possible to access with just a decent pair of shoes. The plan is now to keep this path open throughout the year with regular maintenance parties.

Moving down to the lock we are well on target to complete the lock walls this year but there is still the cill to rebuild together with the oak beams across the top, landscaping the non-towpath bank and repairs to be done to the footbridge. Ladders must be specially made to fit into the ladder recesses. No gates will be put on at this stage but water will be let into the lock at the lower level.

In order to achieve this it has been necessary to build a temporary dam about 60 yards below the lock which will impound the water to a depth of about 4 feet in the lock becoming deeper as the dam is reached. Tom Bennett hired us his large excavator from TM Plant and dredged the pound, building the dam with the spoil over one weekend. The

final touches to the banks will be completed over the next few months by the WRG machine which is much smaller and ideal for finishing off. While Tom was passing he tidied up the lower pound just above the aqueduct so that it is now recognisable as a canal although it will not be finished off until the aqueduct is rebuilt.

This brings us down to the aqueduct which has been in a sorry state of repair for some years now. It was decided by the Council of Management earlier this year that the next project for the Wrinklies, after the lock, would be the aqueduct but nobody knew exactly what state it was in. The whole thing was covered in trees, brambles, and nettles and had been declared unsafe by the FODDC so that it became necessary to erect a footbridge over the brook to take the public footpath which runs through here. The original footbridge provided by the Council was replaced by the 'Bailey' bridge erected by Canal Trust volunteers some years ago and enabled us to take vehicles along the towpath.

One of our Members owns a major Structural Engineering Consultancy in London and offered to have a look at the aqueduct in order to assess its condition

and what might be the best way to undertake repairs. The trouble was that you couldn't see the stone for trees and this is where the WRGies came to our rescue by offering to clear it. A gang of about 25 came down from the London area during the weekend of the Open Day and

gave it the treatment so that not only was the vegetation cleared but also some of the buried stonework uncovered just in time for the initial survey visit.

Another job which the WRGies appeared to enjoy was the demolition of a large caravan which had been languishing in our yard since it was declared surplus to requirements at Over and brought here. It is now stacked in neat piles of scrap metal ready to take to the scrap merchant and earn a little cash. The wood was mostly burnt and we now have a large space in the yard which no doubt will soon have something filling it.

Indeed, within a couple of weeks the two large trees by the Lock had been felled (having been declared unsafe) and a large pile of logs brought into the compound ready for splitting and sale!

# NEWENT

Moving on down the line of the canal we immediately come to the Willows nursery site which has been quiet for a long time (over 3 years now) and which will have to remain so for the time being but I can report that there should be good news soon. Watch this space.

Beyond the Willows is the land which the Trust now works on thanks to Gloucestershire County Council and extends down as far as Bridge Street by the fire station and beyond. The WRGies were also at work here cutting down trees and stump pulling. A temporary fence to keep out fly tippers has now been completed and another fence erected on top of the old railway bridge abutments as a safety precaution.

Altogether an exciting time for the work parties at Newent and no doubt for the local people as word gets around of our intentions to restore about a mile of canal next to the town – more in a future issue of **The Wharfinger**.

As a treat one of our regular volunteers, Margaret, actually volunteered to organise an away day for the Wrinklies. It was more like "I'm going to see the Dudley Canal tunnels, does anyone want to come with me?" Anyway, she soon had enough to fill a minibus and off we all went for the day the tunnels in the morning and then on to the centre of Birmingham for the afternoon to see Brindley Place etc. On the way through the tunnel we were asked if anyone wanted to try a bit of legging so three of our group volunteered to have a go - no doubt practising for the day when our tunnel at Oxenhall is opened! A very enjoyable day which could well become an annual event if Margaret can be persuaded to arrange everything.

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July 13th and Ray, Barbara and Janet were beside the Avon for the Evesham Water Festival. This turned out to be another very hot day, but luckily we were under the trees that line the river. We also had a good view of the decorated boats some ingenious transformations!

The following weekend we took our displays to All Saints in Hereford on the Saturday and had a constant stream of visitors to look at the displays and buy from the Sales stand. Council of Management members were on hand to answer questions, especially regarding Hereford, and the overall impression was when not if we restore the canal in Hereford. The rest of the sales team were at the Marcle Steam Fair - and were joined on Sunday by the All Saints crew.

August Bank Holiday weekend saw the National Waterways Festival at Beale Park near Reading (see page 26). Many thanks to those who helped and to John Craven who made the Grand Holiday Draw.

SEPTEMBER started with the Newent Onion Fair, where Tom and Marjorie Bennett, Penny Shetliffe, Brian and Shirley Fox, Caroline and Bethan Jones and Chris Blunden did sterling work among the thousands of people who attended this growing (numerically and horticulturally) event. Good sales and new members were achieved.

The last weekend in SEPTEMBER was a busy one. On the 27th a South West Canals Day was held at the National Waterways Museum in Gloucester - Janet and Becca Moult attended with a small display and Nigel Bailey gave a presentation on the Canal. Four other canal societies were there - but, unfortunately, not many of the public. Better publicity by the organisers will be required next year as the idea is a very good one.

The 28th September was our annual Oxenhall Open Day and for the first time in almost living memory it did not rain! In fact it was so warm that teas were served outside the Village Hall. Liz Connors and Jill Southall slaved away in the kitchen with the Weavers, Moults and Skeets on the stand. Brian Fox and Tom Bennett made the most of the weather with their guided walks (below). # **Canal Company Documents**

# Recently Acquired by the Trust

Not a great deal of contemporaneous material generated by the Canal Navigation Company, for those interested in scripophily, has come to light.

In his book about the canal David Bick illustrates some of the items which he has discovered: copies of the enabling parliamentary Act, a number of original share certificates and some of the second issue, a notice informing people of the impending closure of the canal and tickets from the weighing machine at Newent Wharf. Recently however, the Trust was sent on approval, from the north of England, fifteen documents, which the Council Management decided purchase. We thought that copies of some of them would be suitable for display in THE WHARF HOUSE at Over.

All but one are printed or written on pale blue paper and date from the 1850's or 60's. The great majority are addressed to Lady C. A. Kyrle Money of 31, Gloucester Place, Portman Square, and are notification of the payment to Messrs. Drummond's Bank, of mortgage interest, together with details of the income tax deducted. They

are signed in typical Victorian subservience by Philip Ballard as her ladyship's obedient servant. They indicate at the top that they were sent from the Canal Company office in Widemarsh Street, Hereford. One is an undated notification informing the recipient that the Canal Company is now in a limited position to redeem

> mortgages. It is unaddressed, but since it came from the same source, presumably it was sent to Lady Kyrle Money. One of the items is illustrated above.



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
Volunteer Mike Hadley has a friend who had a problem with her conifers: they had become drastically overgrown so she had them cut down and had the cut boughs chipped. This presented her with another problem: an enormous heap of woodchip at the foot of her garden. The Over site has a big appetite for woodchip - on the towpath, on the new beds in the car park and around the many trees planted on site. So the challenge became how to shift the enormous pile of free woodchip from Malvern to Over.

The solution was to borrow the Waterways Museum's lorry and increase its capacity by fitting boards to its sides and tail. Then to borrow three wheelbarrows and shift the woodchip by hand the length of her very long garden. This procedure was repeated over three Sundays and on each occasion, during this very hot summer, the garden seemed to get longer and longer as the day wore on. The easy part was unloading at the Over end (because the lorry tips).

The very satisfactory result is that the woodchip has been used in all the ways mentioned above, so thank you to everyone involved in the operation.

No sooner had this woodchip all been brought to site than we also had five lorry loads kindly donated by Forestry Operations of Ross on Wye and delivered to site, which has met all our needs for the year with a little spare. Thank you.

Over the last three years we've grown used to working on the site alongside CJL, Swan Hill's groundwork contractors. They helped us out on many occasions, lending us equipment and sometimes working for us during their lunch break and occasionally we were able to return the favours. Now they've completed their work on site and moved on, bequeathing to us amongst other things (such as many tons of road



planings!), four wheelbarrows all of which have seen better days! Rickety they might be, but we are putting them to good use in place of several we had stolen.

The stone retaining walls in the car park are now complete, thanks to a final load of stone brought over from the

rapidly-diminishing stockpile at Oxenhall. Now the mini excavator "Blue" is back on site, the car park surfacing can be completed.

This year's Restoration Fund BBQ was attended by 50 people who thoroughly enjoyed their meal and a good chat on a wonderfully balmy late-summer evening. A new feature this year was the floodlighting powered by our own generator which enabled our guests to remain till well after darkness had fallen.

We have maintained a good water level in the Basin through the summer thanks to the pump loaned by Andrews Sykes and, once again, the barley straw has kept the blanket weed at bay. We already have a stock of straw for next year, thanks to Brian from

the Model Boat Club. The banks are now looking more mature with various reeds and yellow flag irises and even the willow saplings, planted the year before last, decided that they would grow after all.

Our team of Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme youngsters continues to flourish – as one completes his or her spell working with us another seems to take their place. We have kept them busy painting, planting, weeding, sawing, watering and generally fetching & carrying...and they even

seem to enjoy it.

Finally, the H&G CT now has a flag! I should be able to write "another flag" because one was made for us about 18

months ago. However, before it could be sent to us it was mislaid and none of us ever saw it. Now thanks to Caroline Jones we have a wonderful flag showing the H&G crest in black on yellow which we can fly from our flag-pole on Open Days, high days and holidays.



# Not The Mappa Mundi

but saved from an auction nevertheless!

David McDougall has been instrumental in securing a very important historical record on behalf of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust - for which we are very grateful. Here David tells the story of a map that won't fit in your pocket ...


Tt is a well known fact that the Hereford & Gloucester Canal closed when the Great Western Railway built their (long defunct) branch line over much of the route between Over and Ledbury in 1882. The scheme to build the railway dates back over ten years previously. The proposed Newent Railway intended to use the canal line between Over and Dymock, passing through Oxenhall Tunnel and joining the Ross - Ledbury Railway which would make use of the canal route north of Dymock.


Although the necessary Acts were obtained, plans drawn up and capital subscribed by the shareholders, much of the scheme was never carried out. Using the tunnel was not practical, probably because of the rapid rise of Oxenhall locks for the approach and the restricted size of the bore. The Newent Railway, when built, turned away from the canal by Devin's Lock and made a long gently rising detour to rejoin the canal line beyond Dymock en

route to Ledbury. This change of plan left much of the canal unconverted and ensured the survival of many of its features in this area.

The best source of information on the canal before its conversion will undoubtedly be the plans drawn up for converting it into the railway. Highly accurate large-scale surveys were needed to work out the levels, gradients and radii for the railway's track.

To obtain the Act of Parliament for the railway all the properties along the route had to be identified, along with the landowners and any extra plots needed or surplus to requirements. These details made up a book of reference to the plans. By law copy plans and books had to be deposited or lodged with the County Surveyor's office and the Records Department of the Houses of Parliament. Further copies would be kept by the proposers of the railway, their Engineers and Legal departments.






Newent Railway construction survey map has been known for some time, showing the canal from Over to Malswick. News that the owner was considering selling it at auction but was open to negotiation beforehand, and keen to find a good and relevant home for it, was matched to the challenge of finding material that could be reproduced on display panels at The Wharf House at Over. The map is ideal for this, it is large scale, hand-coloured, in good condition and not faded. When unfolded the map is nearly twelve feet long! The railway shows as a thin red line superimposed over the canal coloured in blue. Cuttings and embankments needing extra land are shown in red with land areas calculated in imperial measurements. significant buildings near the route are shown in detail with living accommodation hand coloured in red. Numbers of land parcels and properties are keyed to the book of reference [not with the plan but probably available elsewhere]. The parish boundaries are exactly as shown for Highnam, Lassington, Rudford, Tibberton, Highleadon and Newent.

Landowners' names are given in detail, attractively sign written in dual coloured block lettering. This map is almost a work of art. It is mounted on linen and folds up neatly into leather covers impressed with gilt letter titling 'Newent Railway Plan 1'. Every curve of the canal is followed; tight curves needing specially shaped triangular sections of map so that when opened out the map takes up the route of the canal as it snakes about.

The scale is an amazing 4 feet to the mile or 20 chains to the foot [take your pick]; so the detail is superb. Here are all the swing bridges, humpback bridges,





culverts, the towpath, hedges, locks [Rudford, Double, Coneybury and Road locks], lock cottages as well as the railway planning details; the curve radius, the station site at Barbers Bridge etc, etc. Even the Civil War monument by Barbers Bridge has been plotted.

The map is regularly stamped with the ownership of The Great Western Railway Chief Engineers Plan Office, Paddington No 17189A - with reminders to return it. The clues to its origin are here, the A might suggest it was the railway company's master copy as would coloured crayon marks across redundant loops

of the canal with their land areas worked out and potential or actual purchasers identified.

Finally the cost – a substantial but not excessive £500 has been paid by the H&G Canal Trust to secure this important record. The map has been deposited for safekeeping at the Gloucestershire Record Office where it can be maintained in the excellent condition in which it has been found.

White lines show the concertina folds that make the map so delicate.

It is likely that a facsimile of the map will form an important part of the display at THE WHARF HOUSE and we also hope that (reduced size!) copies will eventually be produced for sale. In the meantime, as David McDougall says, the map is being professionally stored, under controlled conditions, at the Gloucestershire Record Office.

Specific donations towards the £500 cost of the purchase of this very important map would be greatly appreciated. All donations will be acknowledged and those of £100 and over will be reported in **The Wharfinger** and permanently recorded as part of the eventual display in THE WHARF HOUSE. Please send donations to our Treasurer, Liz Connors (see Contacts, inside back cover). Thank you.

Tour of the Gloucestershire Records Office strongrooms, conservation display, related deeds, our map and the proposed plan of 1791and a commentary from Caroline Jones about historical artefacts related to the Canal. The Map will only be available for viewing at pre-arranged events such as this, for conservation reasons, so we can preserve its fantastic condition which has survived despite its complicated construction.

Our Member, and Over volunteer, Tony Boonham thought an article like this may attract one or two more people who just need a little bit of encouragement – and help them with their own health at the same time!

Some of you may know that I am a little disabled; I suffered quite a serious stroke 6 years ago, but despite this I am told I have made a remarkable recovery. This is

in no small part due to my starting work at the H&G Canal 2 yrs ago. Working in the fresh air, in very pleasant surroundings, with my friends on the Wednesday Gang has been very therapeutic for me and has really built up my confidence – and aided my gradual ability to do more and more with my damaged right side.

This style of recovery is called the Green Gym and many Doctors recommend it. If you thought that you couldn't contribute to the Canal, because you have suffered heart problems or a stroke, why not ask your Doctor what he would recommend; remember that here you work at your own pace and you are never asked to do something beyond your capabilities. If you

need a break you take one when and where you like and, of course, you don't have to come for the whole day. I really look forward to work on Wednesday because it helps bridge that gap between full-time work and retirement; and I feel that I help in a small way in a very worthwhile project.

I have successfully completed my solo parachute jump of 12,000ft. It was amazing but very quick. I jumped into a cloud and couldn't work out which way I was facing for about 5,000ft (which took about 28 seconds). I would like to thank everybody very much for their generosity in sponsoring me. NATIONAL WATERWAYS

FESTIVAL, 2003

For many years Lesley Steans has been one of our volunteers assisting the Trading Company at various events, and regularly helps at the annual IWA National Waterways Festival each August Bank Holiday. 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# Vices, blocks and shadows!

rirstly, I should like to start with a I very grateful 'thank you' to Mr Bennett of Westbury on Severn, and Mr Derrick Wooden (H&G and Gloucester and District Model Boat Club Members) for their generous gifts of a 5" and 8" metal work vice respectively. Also, to Mrs Judy Whitbread for an equally generous gift of a woodwork vice. You will be pleased to know that by the time you read this both workbenches will have been completed and all the vices will be in use. That is, of course, unless somebody decides my services will be better used elsewhere. Thanks to their generosity this appeal is now closed

We now have the new (to us) Roper sit on mower; this is a powerful beast at 14hp and considerably bigger than the previous one. It took but one hour to mow the grass at Over and mowed areas that the other mower wouldn't touch and with its 5 forward gears (we've only had it into 3rd so far) it is very nippy. Charlie Kavangh who kindly stores, services and operates the mower has had to widen his trailer by 8 inches to accommodate it!

I have designed and made several kits to assist in cleaning the hundreds of hardwood flooring blocks that we have to prepare; these blocks will be laid on the ground floor of THE WHARF HOUSE having been reclaimed from the former Over Hospital. Part of this cleaning job requires the removal of 3/4" staples driven into some of the blocks (some blocks have as many as 6) and they are the very devil to remove. This is an ideal job if you are looking for something to do, so please bear this in mind when you are gazing

out of the window on a wet Saturday or Wednesday and wondering what to do next; we've got just the job for you!



One of my next jobs will be to make a tool 'shadow board'; it is very simply a large piece of chipboard, cleaned down and painted white and screwed to the wall above the workbench. Hand tools are then attached/hung onto the board and the outline of the tool is then drawn round in black marker pen so that we know which tool is out and, more important, where it goes back. By now many of you are thinking, "my word he hasn't asked for anything yet" - WRONG - yes, I need some tools to go on the shadow board, please!

We have very few engineering hand tools and mainly we bring our own and yes, you've guessed it, it's the one that you haven't brought that is the one that you need. Besides that, it would be better. I'm sure you will agree, to have our own tools rather than always relying on somebody else remembering to bring the right one. So this is an appeal for spanners, sockets, screwdrivers, files, pliers and all those similar hand tools. If you have any lying around that you don't need, then here is a chance to clear them out and do us a great favour as well. The workbench will be in active use by the time you read this, that is if we can lift it. I have deliberately over-engineered it a little so that Wilf can work on it without it breaking - it's a joke Wilf, honestly!

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# The Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 but was not completed until 1845, making this the last major route built in Britain, but for the navigations of Birmingham and the Manchester Ship Canal. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, utilising some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. the Canal was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed by Dr Beeching in 1964.

The Canal Society was formed in 1983 and replaced in 1992 by Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity. The Trust has an ordinary and corporate membership exceeding 1.100 from all over the country and abroad! Our objective is to fully restore the 34 mile Canal, from its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network at Gloucester to the centre of Hereford. A Steering Committee of Local Authorities, etc. has been formed by the Trust to assist in progressing this objective. We have a major restoration site in each county. which together extend to some 3.5 miles.
