





to Gloucester and started on the Ell Brook aqueduct. It seems an appropriate time to stand back and reflect on what we have achieved since the group started 6 years ago. The WRGies helped right at the beginning with the demolition of much of the upper lock and together with about 6 local volunteers rebuilt the spillweir and the upper level of the lock, mostly in brick, as far as the stop planks. Dave Young was the only one who had experience in the building trade and kept a close eye on the progress offering his advice as necessary and teaching us the basics of brick/stone laying. Unfortunately Dave had to leave due to ill health soon after but we now had some basic knowledge and developed our skills as the work progressed.

Others have joined over the months and years and basic training has been passed on. Experience has shown us the need to develop other skills particularly in transporting and lifting heavy stones, using cutting tools and erecting scaffolding. Mixing of mortar and concrete is not what you might call a skill but we do have our own lime

mortar/concrete specifications and it all has to be mixed by hand (or a machine if we have a lot to do). A very quick calculation indicates that we have mixed and laid around 60 tons of mortar and concrete. Around 1800 stones have been used and each one has been faced and individually cut before being set in place. Hundreds of rough stones have been used in the lower wing walls and several thousand bricks in various places. There are also 250 stainless steel ties (now invisible) which key the new front facing stones into the old rubble filling at the back of the walls.

I was watching Fred Dibnah a few weeks ago as he visited castles built hundreds of years ago explaining the various building techniques and marvelling at the mortar used to hold all that stonework together. Only lime was available to make the mortar mix and there it was today, still as strong as the day it was constructed. It makes you wonder why they went over to using cement in mortar these days, but it would be nice to think that Oxenhall lock with its lime mortar might still be standing and taking boats in even 100 years time.

On June 22nd we celebrated with a ceremony to which local dignitaries and the press were invited. It was advertised as a completion ceremony rather than an opening ceremony in case anyone expected to see boats passing through gates and paddles in action—these will be added at a later date. The imminent rain didn't seem to put anyone off and after a few speeches and the unveiling of another of the Trust's trademark plaques (cast by Nigel Jefferies) everyone retired to the local hall for a barbecue as the rain came down.

It was great to see so many people and hear all those compliments paid. Many of the comments referred to the new pound below the lock which was only about half full for the ceremony, but quickly filled up with rain in the days afterwards. A temporary dam has been built just below the lock to impound the water and 2 x 6" pipes at the base of the dam were taking the water until the time came to fill the pound. Two bungs were inserted into the pipes and the idea is that you tighten a screw in the middle which forces the outer rubber ring to expand and seal the pipe. By Wednesday morning the water was seen to be within 6 inches of the top but the consequent pressure forced one of the bungs to eject and by the afternoon all the water had disappeared down the canal and into the Ell Brook. Nobody actually saw it but it must have been pretty spectacular! After several failed attempts to secure the bung, Dave Jones, who is our Oxenhall lengthsman, devised a method to hold the bungs in place and the water finally reached the top and flowed through the overflow pipe and down the specially constructed spill channel on the Tuesday following.



The aqueduct is now being attacked every Tuesday with a gang sometimes exceeding 12 people - it must be the warmer weather bringing them out! We are immediately being reminded of the strength of the old lime mortar as we attempt to demolish the spandrel walls which are badly cracked and require a total rebuild. We shall need to refine our skills even more as we reconstruct that part of the arch which has fallen and then rebuild the wall on the top. Sitting immediately adjacent to the aqueduct were the remains of three large sycamore trees, felled 3 years ago leaving the stumps. The smallest, which probably weighs about a ton, and the other two, each weighing about 2 tons, have now been removed after considerable effort with a little assistance from "blue" and our faithful tractor.

The Saga of the Willows Nursery

at Newent

It was on June 27th 2000 that John Prescott, the then transport minister, stood up in Parliament to introduce a government booklet entitled "Waterways For Tomorrow" promoting a vision of canals in the future. During his introduction he announced to the House "It's a scandal that canals are seen as a liability not an asset." The document itself declares on the first page "This is in effect a new charter for the waterways", and goes on to state "restoring disused waterways produces many benefits".

Within a few days all these fine words were put to the test by the H & G and more particularly by Diana Organ, MP for the Forest of Dean, who has strongly supported our efforts at restoration for a number of years. She challenged the commitment of the Highways Agency (headed by Mr. Prescott) to the document as they were proposing to sell a piece of land known as The Willows at Newent, through which the Canal used to run. The auction sale was due to take place that evening at a hotel in Newent. The Trust's request to split the land and offer to buy the piece required for restoration had been turned down and the whole plot was due to be sold to the highest bidder which clearly was not an option for the Trust.

Diana knew the right people to speak to and, as a result of her pressure, the sale was called off that afternoon with 3 hours to spare. Anyone who cares to refer back to Wharfinger edition 67 will find all the details, but that was only the beginning of the saga, and I choose the word 'saga' very carefully. My dictionary describes it as a long, heroic story and there can be no doubt it was long and in a way heroic if it is considered in a David and Goliath sort of way. The **H** & **G** Canal Trust with their

champion in Diana Organ against the might of the Highways Agency and Parliament.

The final paragraph of that **The Wharfinger** article intimated that there were proposals to put the nursery back on the market that autumn minus the land required for the Canal restoration but it soon became obvious that time was not a consideration in any negotiations.

It didn't actually take very long for the Highways Agency to agree to separate the Canal land from the rest of the Nursery site and sell as 2 distinct lots and agreement was reached as to where the boundary needed to be drawn so that the Canal could be restored on the original alignment. That was the good news - the bad news was that they had already been offered £20,000 for the Canal land by an unknown bidder and we could only have the land if we matched it! That much money for a piece of derelict railway line measuring about 1\% acres and accounting for 210 yards of Canal. There was no way that the Trust could pay such a sum for this short length of Canal, even if we had it, as this would set a precedent for any other purchases of land required for restoration.

It was pointed out to the Highways Agency that this piece of land, being on the line of the original Canal, was protected from any development or obstruction in the Forest of Dean Local Plan and no change of use would be permitted. This was immediately confirmed in a very unambiguous letter from FODDC and copied to the Highways Agency. Diana Organ was also in touch with her contacts

at the DETR to try and resolve the impasse and succeeded in getting some breathing space before the next move. The sale was postponed until Spring 2001.

Despite further letters and telephone calls and a new valuation by the Agency of the required plot an official letter was received in March offering the land to the Trust for £20,000. The DETR considered that by splitting the plot they were ".....facilitating sales of land which would contribute to restoration projects....", but the sting in the tail came in the following sentence which said that they were obliged to "...sell at the best possible price...". This phrase is often used in government literature and is their way of emphasising the need to look after what is after all land belonging to you and me as members of the public and taxpayers. There was clearly a conflict of interests as far as the DETR was concerned - to get the best possible price or to act in the spirit of Waterways For Tomorrow and make concessions to a charitable Trust which could ultimately be of considerable benefit to the public. This was clearly very disappointing for the Trust as we had made virtually no progress and it was difficult to see where to go from here. A letter declining the offer was sent to the Highways Agency who quickly replied saying that the land would be put on the market later that summer.

Further letters to the government from Diana Organ and the Trust proved of no avail so the Trust decided to approach the Waterways Trust, a national body only in existence for about a year but already making an impact on canal affairs throughout the country. They agreed to assist in whatever way they could and together with the continuing pressure from Diana the sale was again put back until the following year, 2002.

However, something totally unconnected to our canal business happened in

parliament in December 2001, but which had important implications to our case. Whilst researching another matter Penny Environmental & Planning came across reference to an MP who stood up in question time and asked the Secretary of State for Transport - "Under what circumstances could a local authority sell assets at other than best value?" The reply was quite unambiguous - Consent has been given by an existing Act of Parliament for Local Authorities to dispose "in certain circumstances of the freehold or leasehold interests in property to be used for charitable, recreational and certain retail and commercial uses". The reply does specify Local Authorities but it hardly seems reasonable for the Secretary of State for Transport to permit such disposals by one public body and not by the Highway Agency, another public body. This enabled us to make a strong case that they did not, in these circumstances, have to secure the best price and that this could be outweighed by the public benefit.

A meeting was arranged in May, 2002 between the Canal Trust, The Waterways Trust, Diana Organ, the Highways Agency and chaired by David Jamieson (an under secretary at the DETR) in a committee room in the House of Commons, Dick Skeet and I represented the Trust and it was clear from the start that a decision had been made to do a deal providing the Trust could put together a business plan for the Canal, not only including the Willows but for a considerable length around Newent. Such a plan would open the way for the Agency to get around the "best possible price" stumbling block as permitted in the aforesaid Act. After about 1/2 hour of discussion (which I am informed is pretty good for an under secretary) we came away knowing what had to be done.

At this point Diana stepped down and let the Canal Trust, The Waterways Trust and the Highways Agency get on with the job of formulating the business plan. After many months we still seemed to be stalled and no progress seemed to be in sight whatever we produced.


Penny Environmental & Planning was called in to hold a further meeting with the Highway Agency to try to move matters forward. This finally got to the bottom of their concerns and agreement was reached as to what was a suitable 'nominal sum' for the land and what additional paperwork was required to meet the Highway Agency's requirements. This was significantly supported by a letter from Fred Passant, Mayor of Newent setting out how important the Canal will be to the future tourism and


thus economy of Newent. This clinched it and at last we had a formal offer from the Agency on 12th August 2003 to sell the land to the Trust for £1,000, which was rapidly accepted!

So you might think that shortly afterwards the Trust became the owner of the site? Well things always drag on and it was only on 22nd July 2004 that we finally completed the purchase.

Although long and drawn out this is a very important success for the Canal Trust in setting the principles for the transfer of public land, which is already being used elsewhere....

Volunteers' Socials in Hereford





Volunteers working at the Hereford end of the Canal and other local members have been meeting one evening a month for a drink, a chat and a walk along the Canal line. Meeting at 7.30 pm we have set off at 8 for a leisurely walk noting the local architecture and whether it preceded the Canal or was built in connection with the Canal. Copies of old maps were consulted to try and decide when the house adjacent to the Canal bridge on Newtown Road was built until some bright spark noticed a date plaque fixed to the wall beneath the eaves. Does anyone know what this building was used for?

In May and June six or seven of us set out from the Heart of Oak PH on Edgar Street and followed the line of the Canal back to Canal Road. In June we had the pleasure of the company of archaeologist Ron Shoesmith so we also did a detour into the Blackfriars Monastery gardens and learnt a little of its history.

Street making for Mortimer Road, Burcott Road and then back to the pub. We noted a gentle rise in Mortimer Road where there used to be a bridge over the Canal and David described his sight of a little bit of it when utilities companies were excavating trenches.

August's walk was from the Swan Inn on Aylestone Hill just near the roundabout on the road to Worcester. We had time to walk back to the tunnel entrance on College Road and peer down (from the pavement) through the trees to the tunnel portal. There was plenty to see, and we talked about the work going on at Aylestone Park. Why not join us – you will be made very welcome.

At the end of July the Canal Trust hosted the Herefordshire Federation of Women's Institutes members for a day, one of the many activities of the Trust to raise its profile in the community and funds towards restoration ...

Sixty members of Herefordshire Federation of W.I.s were picked up on the outskirts of Hereford by enthusiastic members of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust and taken on an extensive tour of stretches and remains of the Canal, which finally arrived in Hereford in 1845. At the beginning of the tour they were each given various items of literature about the Canal Trust including a copy of **The Wharfinger** and, most usefully, an excellent guide explaining the places they were going to visit.

To their surprise the minibuses plunged into the middle of Hereford, when they were shown short stretches of Canal line which they must have seen many times without realising what it was, and heard of the plans to bring a Canal Basin and boats into the centre of the city. A grand idea for local citizens and tourists alike!

Via the Skew Bridge at Monkhide, and Canal in water, and little lanes and drives we arrived at Dymock for an excellent lunch (well up to W.I. standards!) with a choice of four hot main courses and a luscious selection of sweets provided by the ladies of the Canal Trust.

After lunch we visited the Oxenhall Lock, which our guides and drivers had helped to restore with picks and shovels and the odd help of modern machinery where possible.

We heard stories of the making of tunnels and cuttings all by hand and could imagine the dangerous and exhausting work of the navvies at the end of the eighteenth century.

The final stage of the tour was a highly organised visit to the "new" Canal Basin at Over. We were divided into four groups – one drank tea with superb cake, another toured the site, a third inspected the splendid new visitors centre and restaurant in construction – while the fourth had a short boat trip on *Mister Maysey*.

Altogether a very full day and an inspiring introduction to the work and ambitions of the energetic members of the Canal Trust.




EVERYONE IS WELCOME to our monthly meetings held on the 3rd Tuesday of every month, 7.30pm for 8pm start.

Change of venue for our Social Evenings

THE WHARF HOUSE

With our target opening date for the ground floor set for next spring, work in THE WHARF HOUSE must continue at a pace. Wilf Jones, our fit-out manager, is pulling all the stops out to achieve this goal and views each task as a challenge, as it rears it's head!

As many Members will know, I have the task of phoning up volunteers to see if they are available for our workins. Most of them have numerous commitments besides helping the Trust. Those working often work weekends too and those who have retired, barely have time to fit in sleeping with all the other things they are committed to. From this experience I have learnt than when I retire from full time employment my life is likely to get busier than it is now. Best not retire for a long time then, thinks I!

Seriously though, we do have a great team of volunteers who turn up whenever they are able, and are usually game to take on most tasks that Wilf has lined up for that weekend. As volunteers, they all reserve the right to say, "no, that job is not for me", and Wilf always has another dozen possibilities up his sleeve – bless him.

As David reported last edition, the first contract has been let to the electricians, who have been in wiring up parts of the ground floor. The lighting has been planned to change the 'mood' of the building from a day-time 'tea room' to an 'evening restaurant'.

The plasterers will hopefully have completed their work on the ground floor by the time you read this. We have been working hard to have the ground floor cleared of as much unnecessary clutter as possible. Model Boat Club member, Rob Strong, came in to advise us on the layout of the disabled toilet; this helped us to finally decide on the position of the wall between that and the storeroom. A debate which had been going on for some months, but within an hour of his advice, the wall had been started.

Outside, the grass and summer bedding, which was planted as a temporary splash of colour has flourished and the grass is likely to remain for the foreseeable future.

recipients being surcharged for Royal
Mail's error), was overcome by our note
on the labels "franked by Royal Mail –
deficient postage is their responsibility" – we
thought the challenge was solved!

Stories were heard, earlier in the year, that there would be a 20% surcharge on all such Royal Mail bulk-franked mail; however two enquiries with the local sorting office revealed no such proposals – until Janet Moult took the last edition for franking and was told there was a



new 20% surcharge for passing the envelopes through Royal Mail franking machines ... so that is why your envelope has a stamp on it.

If you know of a business located in or near Hereford (where our distribution team is based) who would be prepared for us to use their franking machine four times a year (and the Canal Trust reimburse the face value of the postage), then please let Janet Moult know (see Contacts – inside back cover).

A Marque of Success

Canal Society Founder Member, Canal Trust Director and Membership Secretary, might be enough for anyone – but utilising the skills of his 'day job', Nigel Jefferies is also the man behind our cast aluminium plaques ...

Canal plaque is 'milestone'

IT was unveiling day for the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Society when members saw the fruits of their labours permanantly marked with a plaque on the Widemarsh canal bridge, Hereford.

Canal buffs had devoted one of their regular activity Sundays to clearing a section alongside the canal

Society member Mike Potts said: "The plaque is to make sure that everyone knows that this is the old Hereford canal."

Hereford Mayor Councillor Sim Proctor unveilled the plaque made by Aylestone Hill High School students.

Following the unveiling of a plaque beside the first lock to be restored by the Trust, I thought members may be interested to learn the provenance of the elliptical plaque.

One of the first publicity events organised by the Canal Society following its formation in 1983, was to place a plaque on Widemarsh Bridge, Hereford. At the time the membership of the Society was only about 50, financial resources were limited and the purchase of a suitable plaque was prohibitively expensive. However, the Technology Department of Aylestone School, Hereford, came to the rescue and made a plaque. The plaque was unveiled by the then Mayor of Hereford, in the summer

of 1984. The original plaque spawned several more.

When a plaque was required for House Lock, near Newent, Gloucestershire, it seemed appropriate to use a similar plaque to the one placed on the adjacent Lock House commemorating its restoration in 1993. The plaques are sand cast in aluminium alloy using a pattern made from plywood and plastic letters.

When the canal was completed in 1845 cast iron plaques mounted in an ashlar block were placed at every mile, and half mile, along the line of the Canal; this was a requirement of the 1793 act of parliament which authorised the construction of the canal. Unfortunately,

most of these no longer exists, but it could be said the Canal Trust is following in a similar mould.

In the early years of the then Society a person living in Leomister had "rescued" at least three of the original mileage plaques, however, I have lost contact with the person concerned. If any member is aware of the person, or the whereabouts of the original plaques he had in his possession, (or of any other artifacts) we would be interested to know.

The Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 but was not completed until 1845, making this the last major route built in Britain, but for the navigations of Birmingham and the Manchester Ship Canal. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, utilising some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. the Canal was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed by Dr Beeching in 1964.

The Canal Society was formed in 1983 and replaced in 1992 by Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity. The Trust has an ordinary and corporate membership exceeding 1.100 from all over the country and abroad! Our objective is to fully restore the 34 mile Canal, from its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network at Gloucester to the centre of Hereford. A Steering Committee of Local Authorities, etc. has been formed by the Trust to assist in progressing this objective. We have a major restoration site in each county, which together extend to some 3.5 miles.
