



How ...?



The fact that in recent years all the 'civil engineering' construction work has gone on within Gloucestershire (Over Canal Basin, the reconstruction of House Lock and the Ell Brook Aqueduct at Oxenhall for example) led to an even greater perceived imbalance in what we have been doing – at least in physical work terms 'on the ground'. Thanks to our Yarkhill Team we have an active restoration site within Herefordshire but the length does not contain any significant structures – not that restoring the main 'track' of the rural canal in the county is any less important.

We have been working hard to address the imbalance between the two counties. Our partnership with **Herefordshire Council** and the local organisations/community to deliver the new **Aylestone Park** should have resulted in a restored section of the canal alongside the Park by now – that was **how** we intended to restore our first section within Hereford City boundary!

The complication of contaminated silt (a legacy of past industry some distance away) meant that we were unable to undertake the work; a specialist contractor was required. Undaunted, the first construction work within the City by **H&G CT** volunteers (assisted by **WRG**) was non-canal work within the Park. In turn, **Herefordshire Council** have let a

proceed.



Whilst the **Aylestone Park** section was initially regarded as an 'easy' section to restore, the adjacent length (up to the portal of **Aylestone Tunnel**, running back towards the City centre), was most certainly not as it comprises an infilled cutting with (albeit temporary) commercial activities within **Holmer Trading Estate** above. The front cover of this edition shows how this specific section could look. *All very well you may say – but how do we intend to restore this section?* Subject to the granting of Planning Permission, the answer lies overleaf!

Extensive negotiations and liaison continues regarding the Edgar Street redevelopment proposals Hereford City; we have passed considerable information about the Canal to the Masterplan Team and, utilising our long-established contacts throughout the area, also assisted with information on 'non-canal' issues as well. As demonstrated at Over Basin. THE WHARF HOUSE, Aylestone Park, and now at Holmer Trading Estate, the **H&G Canal Trust** can play a significant (and at times, unusual) role in producing results. It is not just physical restoration of the Canal by the Canal Trust that will deliver it to Hereford; it is partnership with a wide range of interested parties - from the local authority to developers.

That's how we intend to get the Canal back right into the heart of Hereford City. That's how Hereford will secure a significant public amenity and commercial asset for the long-term benefit of both the City and the whole community.

Developers to Restore Canal at

Holmer Trading Estate


A major new development proposal in Hereford is to see one of the most difficult sections of the Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal restored as an integral part of the development scheme.



Herefordshire Residential Developments submitted a Planning Application to redevelop Holmer trading estate in mid

May. We have been working closely with them to bring forward the redevelopment of the site for the last 18 months. This will see ¼ mile of the Canal restored right up to Aylestone Park and include the transfer to the Canal Trust of the restored Canal and, in addition, the ¼ mile tunnel under Aylestone Hill.

restored as part of the adjoining development, but the developers have also worked closely with us to secure an extremely high quality prestigious development on the site which makes the most of the Canalside setting". He continued, "We welcome these proposals and are always pleased to be able to work with developers from the outset of schemes, as we have on this Not only will the proposals make a huge improvement to the area but they also provide a much improved quality of employment space to replace what already exists on the site, alongside the proposed imaginative waterside



The section will see the canal cutting fully restored with a feature footbridge across, linking the new development to Victoria Park and via the cycleways already completed by the Trust to Aylestone Park.

As normal on such developments, there will be annual payments to the Canal Trust to meet the long term restoration, maintenance and management costs of the Canal.

This summer will also see the restoration

of the adjacent section of the Canal through Aylestone Park as part of

already constructed an extensive network of footpaths/cycleways and two viewpoints, as well as undertaking significant landscaping works.

The works at Holmer form an important part of the overall strategy for restoring the Canal within Hereford. This will see further significant progress as part of the major Edgar Street Grid redevelopment of the City which includes the construction of a large new Canal terminus basin and approach Canal heading back towards the proposed Holmer development and Avlestone Park.

Work at Yarkhill


My last report ended with the news of having 2 ft of water along this whole length of the canal. Imagine my excitement when in February the Canal became full and overflowing! Since then and with the subsequent dry period it's a case of "going – going – gone"! Not all the water has gone, but so much that it was possible for us to remove temporary sand bag dam number two and to raise the level of dam three to just under 30 inches. This dam is already holding back water suggesting that the first 275 yards of this section has no major leaks in its base.

Throughout the winter the Yarkhill Team, joined in January by Robert (a new volunteer), have worked hard at coppicing the towpath ditch bank hedge line. Our thanks to **Waterway Recovery Group** – Southwest for assisting for a weekend and making it possible for us to achieve our goal of completing this task.

"Step Construction Associates" have been in action again and volunteers now have a safe route down the bank from the main road to access Mr. Mess's field and 'our' stretch of the canal. Unfortunately Tim injured his ankle whilst assisting me in this task. We all wish him a full recovery and look forward to him re-joining our work parties – please!

WRG-BITM (not WRG-N, S, E or W but "Bit In The Middle"!) also offered their services, which were gratefully accepted, and they made a start on coppicing 'the wild side' ditch bank hedge line. This work was greatly assisted by Mr. Michael Lewis from Whitwick Manor Estate giving us permission to work from the field adjoining the canal and BITM responded by carrying out a very good job and leaving a very tidy field on completion. Our thanks to them all.

The Team carried out clearance work from the entrance field and **Michael Mess** of **Stonehouse Farm** and **Rod**




Stevens of R.J. & R.E. Stevens Plant Sales carried out ditching and ground

profiling work, further easing our access to the canal which was also greatly appreciated.

The final achievement of our winter programme was the quick completion of our sleeper bridge from the site hut to the canal towpath. Rod's capability with his digger, in positioning and levelling the two main support beams with a mass equivalent to five railway sleepers, had a lot to do with this. Our sincere thanks to Michael and Paul Mess for their continued support and allowing us access across their land and to Rod Stevens for his beam and earth moving capabilities!

RESTORATION

at Oxenhall by Brian Fox

Cummer has arrived with a vengeance **)** - although it is only April as I write! The dining tables and chairs have come out and the lunch/tea breaks tend to get extended as the sun shines and a start is made on the tanning process. I seem to remember saying last time that progress was slow due to the winter rain and frost - but at least it was too cold to hang around for long and activity was necessary to keep warm. There is a danger that work will become even slower as it gets hotter and the sweating starts and drink breaks have to be taken! There is no pressure to finish by a certain date as it was with the first phase at Over and the overriding criterion at Oxenhall is that it must be enjoyable. Can we expect a flood of new volunteers after they read this?

Despite our leisurely approach things do get done and I can report that the aqueduct arch over the steel former is now complete and work has started on the spandrel wall above. Unfortunately, this means a considerable amount of concrete to be mixed (hard work even with a mixer) and large stones to be cut and transported into their correct positions, all as the temperatures continue to rise. Over the years we have developed means of transport (wheelbarrows, trolleys, tractor, pulleys and electric hoist) to alleviate the strain on our backs which is essential in order to comply with our Risk Assessment of each task and to cope without serious injury. However, this doesn't avoid stiff muscles and minor scrapes - or the odd boot full of Brook water! The stone saw bench has been overhauled (see article on page 37) and should make our life easier when cutting large stones.

Our winter maintenance programme was completed by the beginning of March, so we now leave the birds and other wildlife in peace to go about their normal business until next autumn/winter, when no doubt there will be





more that requires attention outside the nesting season. Some of the work that we do along the towpath may appear a little drastic, but we are dealing with trees and bushes which have not been managed for many years, and can get out of hand if left too long. Several hawthorns blew down this winter because they had become too tall; unfortunately this means that roots and all are dragged from the ground, the tree is lost, and a gap appears in the hedge. It is quite clear that these canalside hedges have never been properly 'laid' and maintained, so we shall be taking advice on how best to tackle this challenge in the future. In the meantime a short stretch has seen some tall hawthorns cut off at waist height so that they will send up some new growth. We have filled in the gaps with hawthorn cuttings which will hopefully grow and fill out the hedge. A small nursery has also been started to grow more which will fill more gaps in time.

We have also seen two large branches broken from canalside willow trees this winter (see 'Extreme Gardening - Wind in the Willows' in the last edition). It is clear on closer inspection that these trees are not healthy and will need some drastic attention but again we will be taking specific advice. We can't afford to leave these trees untouched if there is any danger to the public who walk the footpath directly beneath. It is certainly not a job for our own trained chainsaw operators and may involve bringing in qualified tree surgeons. Two old conifers which were probably planted next to the platforms soon after Newent station was built in 1883 have now disappeared. One was blown down and the other was deemed to be unsafe and cut down by the Council, whilst a large sycamore next to the old station platforms was uprooted and lays there awaiting our gang to cut it up and take it away for logging.

As we have said before, restoration of a canal is not just that but increasingly involves the necessary maintenance of the canal and towpath corridor (and finding the volunteers to do it)! There are those in our team who prefer this type of activity, and who can argue that a roaring bonfire on a cold winters day is not welcome; so why not come along - we can probably find something to suit your tastes be it heat from bonfires or the sun that spurs you on!

Were there DEATHS at the

Apart from managing our Membership records
Council of Management Member Nigel Jefferies has
always taken a keen interest in the history of 'our' canal. His
recent topic of research was the potential for navvies to have lost their
lives during the construction of Oxenhall Tunnel. However, as Nigel's account
shows, his research proved to be more challenging than he first thought . . .

Trecently read again Humphrey Household's excellent book entitled "The Thames and Severn Canal". On page 76, he records that there is circumstantial evidence for a number of navvies having lost their lives during the construction of Sapperton Tunnel, because, during the years of its construction, the number of burials recorded in the parishes of Sapperton and Coates, is almost double that of the preceding and following years. Sapperton Tunnel was the "Channel Tunnel" of its day, being 3,817 yards long and was much larger than the earlier canal tunnels, being built to a bore of 15' square.

This set me wondering if there may be similar evidence in the parish records during the construction of Oxenhall Tunnel on "our" canal, which was 2,192 yards long, although only built to a width of 9'. I thought that any fatalities would be recorded in the parish records

at Dymock and Newent, however, when I looked in my copy of Pevsner it pointed out that the church at Oxenhall, had been built in 1865 – long after the construction of the Tunnel!

Enquiries led me to discover the records for the churches concerned are now kept at Gloucester Records Office. I discovered in the Dymock church records, the burial on 28th October, 1793 of Richard Coates, a canal digger, who died of small pox, aged 26. On 28th July 1797, when the

tunnel was under construction, Thomas Hart aged 20 was buried after being found dead in the canal, but it is recorded he was supposed to have been murdered!

At Newent on the 8th August 1793, Elizabeth Boyce, a wife, was buried, after being accidentally drowned in the canal. On 8th September 1793, John Uzzell, a husband, was buried after having been accidentally killed at the canal, but at this date, construction of the tunnel had not begun. During the years of construction of the tunnel, there is no significant increase in the number of burials at these two churches so I appear to have drawn a blank.

However, when I discussed my findings with one of the archivists, he helpfully suggested that I should look in the parish records for Oxenhall. I pointed out to him that Pevsner records that Oxenhall Church was built in 1865, but he assured me there would have been an

earlier church on the site. With renewed enthusiasm, I delved into the Oxenhall records, only to find that the microfilm of the actual records is very largely illegible. The Bishop's records, also on microfilm. are in a similar condition. Having pointed this out to the archivist, he agreed to allow me to consult the actual register, but he suspected that if the microfilm is largely illegible, the actual register would be in a similar condition. When it came from the vault. I fear his opinion proved to be the case; apart from a few words and the date at the beginning of most years, due to the faded ink, holes in the paper and soiling, I could gain little information. The only conclusion I could draw, is that the space on the pages relating to the years concerned, is not significantly greater than on the preceding and following years; so perhaps this is an indication, that there were not a significant number of fatalities as a result of excavating Oxenhall Tunnel. ◆ NJ



ANNUAL REPORT

FOR YEAR ENDING 28TH FEBRUARY 2007

This is the fifteenth Annual Report of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust Limited [a non-profit distributing company [formed in April 1992, No.2704407], which is a Registered Charity [1010721] and of the wholly owned Trading Company - Hereford-shire and Gloucestershire Canal (Sales) Ltd. [2710215]]. They replaced the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Society which was launched in 1983. It is also the report of THE WHARF HOUSE COMPANY LTD. [4627931], the wholly owned subsidiary of the Canal Trust, donating all profits to canal restoration. The Canal Trust is indebted to its Council of Management, and to the Trading Company Board; during the period under review [year ended 28th February 2007] those listed below have been members:-

The 12 months ended 28th February 2007 was another busy year for our volunteers. H&G CT continued to work at Aylestone Park, Oxenhall, Over and Yarkhill, gratefully receiving Grant Aid for three of the sites, and from Restoration Fund Members. The H&G CT continues to be fully committed to supporting THE WHARF House, with volunteers (and financially if necessary). However, a successful trading year for the Restaurant, Tea-Rooms and Visitor Centre meant that THE WHARF HOUSE COMPANY was in a position to take on the £50,000 loan which the H&G CT had negotiated to cover start-up costs. This is in line with our determination that THE WHARF House will not negatively impact on the ongoing running of the H&G CT. The next important stage in our commitment that the enterprise will generate sufficient profits to make meaningful donations to the H&G CT is to open the B&B. To facilitate completion of the fit-out, late in the period an appeal was made through The Wharfinger for loans or donations; we were delighted to receive our first donation in February 2007. H&GC Sales continued to spread the word about the Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal at events locally & nationally and despite increasingly difficult trading conditions the small team's hard work has enabled another £3,000 to be handed over to the H&G CT. The Socials continue to be popular and we are now settled in at the Royal Oak, Much Marcle; the higher cost of hiring the function room has meant a small admission charge - however attendances have continued to be excellent.

In Gloucestershire our volunteers at **Oxenhall** have now expanded their work over the boundary into Newent. Restoration is ongoing on the Aqueduct; purchase of the adjacent Willows Nursery land and the lease of the next section to the fire station means that we sometimes split our efforts into 3 or 4 separate groups to cope with the extra work. During the winter scrub clearance and conservation work on trees

and vegetation has been undertaken together with vital general maintenance of the restored sections where we have ownership. Plans are now being prepared for the long term restoration of the canal in this area so the necessary liaison can commence and the essential finance sought. The major Over project for the year was landscaping the area between the Horseshoe Drive pavement and the 'Bailey' bridge - the Wharf Approaches project. We laid paviors to match those around THE WHARF House and formed a new pushchair and wheelchair friendly path down to the Basin. A short flight of steps creates a pedestrian short-cut beside the bridge. A new wrought iron bench, in memory of a Gloucester and District Model Boat Club member, was installed near the slipway and unveiled at an Open Day. New information boards with larger text and a more sturdy design were placed permanently around the site and "Mister Maysey", our trip boat was refurbished. THE WHARF House continued to establish itself and attracted a number of influential visitors as well as providing an impressive location to meet landowners, major utility companies and developers to discuss proposals on other parts of the Canal. Of particular note were the increasing favourable food reviews in the press. A small dedicated team of volunteers continued to make progress on fitting out the upper floors with the very limited finance available pending availability of funds to permit final fit-out so that the B&B facilities can be brought into use in order to maximise income. An increasing number of new Members are now recruited following a visit to The WHARF HOUSE.

In Herefordshire work continued at Aylestone Park although the main focus there was the Herefordshire Council's appointment of a specialist Contractor to undertake removal of the contaminated silt from the Canal. The Yarkhill Team, aided by two visits from WRG-SW, achieved much in their first full year. The cleared towpath was maintained providing a pleasant walk for an ever-increasing number of walkers many stopping to convey support and appreciation. There was considerable stump pulling/general clearance within the canal bed, the towpath ditch hedge line was coppiced and a flight of steps and a bridge were constructed connecting the towpath to the permitted footpath. A successful Open Day attracted 120 people for guided walks; 60 visited a display in the village hall. During the year 126 work parties amounted to 408 persondays of work - a very significant contribution to the work of H&G CT.

Extensive 'behind the scenes' liaison continues in respect of many aspects; not least during the year in respect of agreement in relation to the routing, level and 'accommodation works' for the 48" diameter National Grid natural gas pipeline that is to cross over Oxenhall Tunnel and significant discussions and information relating to the Edgar Street Grid redevelopment of Hereford City.

Summary (abridged) Accounts will be available at the AGM or Members may obtain a full set by sending a large SAE to the Treasurer. The full accounts will also be available at the AGM.

Every Member who is entitled to vote at an AGM may appoint a proxy to vote in his/her stead. A proxy must be someone entitled to vote at the meeting. Proxy forms are available from Liz Connors. The forms must be completed, signed and returned to her so that they are received at least 48 hours prior to the commencement of the AGM.

We aim to allow people ample time for general questions after the close of formal business. Prior notice of questions should ensure a comprehensive response and would be greatly appreciated. Note regarding Agenda item No.6; one third of the Members of the Managing Council are required to stand down each year. All those standing down (listed at 6. on p.19) are offering themselves for reelection unless otherwise stated. New volunteers to serve on the Council of Management are welcome; as reported in the last edition of **The Wharfinger** formal Nominations (on forms obtainable from the Treasurer) have to be received not less than 7 days nor more than 28 days prior to the AGM. The maximum size of the CofM is 18 and, unless new nominations bring the total in excess of this number, the above stated Members will be returned un-opposed. The CofM is also empowered to Co-opt Members during the year (subject to the maximum size not being exceeded).





OVER Up hy Nigel Bailey



Our work was rewarded when a wedding party at THE WHARF HOUSE used our path for their photos.





Ithink it is true to say that all of our hard and painstaking work on the paving of the entrance to the Over Canal Basin is now complete. The winding path, which you saw half completed in the last issue, now runs from the entrance down to the gravel path beside the Basin. It would not surprise me if Paul Henshaw is still having nightmares about cutting little concrete triangles with the angle grinder!

It was probably, while prevented from sleeping, that Paul came up with a planting scheme for the area between the winding path and the retaining wall. This is now starting to take shape, augmented by some new trees planted between the path and the railings. The next step will be to build the brick pillars (incorporating the masonry blocks and gate hinge pins that we reclaimed from the former entrance to the Over Hospital mortuary block) to further enhance the entrance to the Basin area.

During this project a good deal of rubble built up in a heap by the 'Bailey' bridge. This has now been dispersed and used to improve the surface of what we refer to as Pump Hill Road (the path between the pump shaft and the inlet from the Leadon). We have also completed a further section of post-and-rail fence beside the lock. This looks very attractive and is essential to provide a clear deterrent to anyone approaching the steep edge of the lock.

Over Easter I managed to fit in a job I've been itching to do for a couple of years! At that time I built the small stone retaining wall on the left-hand side of the entrance to the car park. I then ran out of stone for

finishing the right-hand side. Over the intervening period I've been collecting suitable stones. After a heavy rainfall it is surprising what emerges from the ground so I've been stockpiling it - or keeping a mental note of where to find it!

I had built up sufficient stock many months ago but there are always other priorities so the wall still did not get built. I figured that if I slipped in to site quietly on a day no one else was working I could get the job done, so that's what I did. There is still one final step to take: one section of concrete railway sleeper needs moving from near the entrance to a gap that is waiting for it in one of the car park bays. Not wanting to suffer a hernia, I did not try that task on my own!

You will read elsewhere

in this issue about a practical use for our Over willows (It's a Wigloo - p.30). We now have a small stock of cut willow which might be of interest to any basket weavers or willow "sculptors". If you would like to make use of any of the willow, particularly if you are able to produce high quality items for sale at THE WHARF HOUSE, then please let me

or any member of THE WHARF House team know.

On Saturday March 17th we held this year's event to thank members of the Restoration Fund.

About 20 contributors to the Fund assembled at THE WHARF HOUSE for a presentation on progress on the Over site over the last year. 

We have a permanent display in The Wharf House Visitor Centre telling the story of the osiers (willow) grown there in the past – a tradition that the H&G CT have re-established on site (see Mike Bowden's article "On the Trail of the Soft Red Osier" on p.28 of edition 82 of The Wharfinger). However, little did we know that Member (and teacher) Liz Bailey would put some of our home grown material to such an unusual and worthwhile use at her new school . . . how do you stop an igloo melting . . . build a living wigloo!

At one of the Over Open Days last year, I was interested to see local resident Janice Lyall weaving willow animals from the osiers grown along the towpath at Over. Not one to miss an opportunity, I approached Mike Bowden, who masterminded the growing of the osiers, and casually asked 'How do you fancy creating a living willow sculpture?' My Early Years' Centre had relocated to a new school with a grassy outside area which lacked any permanent structure to enhance children's play. Mike was

a bit apprehensive as he had not done anything like this before; but this did not seem to concern him as much as the thought of working with a group of preschool children!

In February Mike came to a staff meeting to plan the project, where it was decided to build a living willow igloo as a den for the children. We organised a day for digging out the base for the igloo, a morning to cut the willows and another day to construct the living sculpture. The whole idea fired the enthusiasm of many parents in the Centre.

We had a fantastic response to our request for helpers for our 'Dig out' day. Twenty parents and their children cleared the area for an eight-foot diameter igloo with an eight-foot long by three-foot wide entrance tunnel. We laid the black fabric 'terram', kindly donated by a parent, and in-filled the area with play bark. Due to the high levels of water in the Over Canal Basin and the River Leadon at the time, it was unsafe for the children to help cut the willows. However the staff faithfully

turned up on a Sunday morning to help Mike carry out this task. The willows were sorted and bundled into red and green stemmed varieties and kept in water at the Centre ready for use the following week.


The big day arrived. Mike planned the construction down to the last detail to ensure that it was a success; even constructing a mini version in his back garden! Plans became increasingly ambitious. Mike suggested it would be nice for the children to have some porthole windows in the igloo and a staff member pointed out that it would definitely be an advantage for staff and other adults to have access to the igloo through a side entrance. A wise suggestion as the thought of having to crawl through the tunnel several times each day to play with the children was, on reflection, not a good idea!

The wigloo was tested!

Parents and children inserted the first willows rods through holes in the terram around the perimeter of the circle under Mike's guidance. More and more were added until we had a perfect dome (complete with two portholes and a woven back door!). After a short break for lunch, the adjoining tunnel was created.

This project was such fun and so enjoyable. The parents in particular are very proud of their efforts and rightly so. The sculpture has been admired by so many people and is already growing and in daily use. On behalf of everyone I work with, I would like to thank the H&G CT for the willows and especially Mike for his time and commitment. The living sculpture is providing a great deal of pleasure for the children currently in the Centre and will benefit children in the community for many years to come.

Our thanks to Liz for making a donation of £50 to H&G CT funds in recognition of Mike's voluntary efforts away from the Canal! – Ed.

The LOCK HOUSE at Oxenhall

Our well known contributor takes on an additional task to his regular restoration updates and delves into the history of the property adjacent to House Lock at Oxenhall - but when is a house a cottage . . . ?

onstruction of the H & G canal was started at Over in 1792 and the priority was to reach Hereford with the money that had been raised so all the effort was put into digging the waterway and construction of locks and bridges. Luxuries like houses for employees would not have been considered at that time and it transpired that the money ran out anyway when the canal had only reached Ledbury. Staff newly employed in the operation of the canal, like lock keepers, must have lived in rented accommodation locally.

Trade was slow at first with sufficient income to pay the staff and it wasn't until 1818 that the manager announced that there was £1,200 in credit and plans were drawn up to build a house for the lock keeper, possibly at Rudford. In 1831 another house was built at Over and by 1838 there was enough capital in hand to build the lock house at

Oxenhall. The house, with a small garden adjacent, was built on the instructions of Stephen Ballard, then canal manager, and consisted of 3 rooms downstairs and 2 bedrooms upstairs with the brick privy at the bottom of the garden. It is not clear why the house was built in this location as there was a more accessible site adjacent to the next lock on the canal where the old coal branch canal came in! The lock

overspill channel already existed to take the surplus water around the lock so it meant the house had to be built bridging this and also taking account of a steep slope into the field behind.

The house is clearly built to the same design as the one featured on the front cover of David Bick's first edition of the H&G history, which has subsequently been shown to be probably the Lock House at Rudford, built many years earlier. There are minor modifications, but generally the two are the same, with walls that are embellished with brick pilasters at intervals which, it has been suggested, were associated with the Greek Revival style prevalent in the pre Victorian era. It is now quite unique to the

area, as the Rudford House was demolished to make way for

> the railway, and consequently the house at Oxenhall was Listed Grade II in 1985 (at the instigation of the then Canal Society). There has been some movement in

the walls and they have more recently been tied together with steel ties from front to back - but basically it is still the same as when constructed. The occupant is described as "lock keeper" in early

census returns but it is most likely that he was actually responsible for a length of canal, which in this case may have extended from Newent to Oxenhall tunnel, and would

have included 4 locks and several bridges. He would make sure that the canal was navigable and not leaking plus organising maintenance of the locks, bridges and any hedges/trees that needed management. Census returns show that in 1841 the lock keeper was Richard Goode who lived

there with his wife and 3 children. He was a local Newent man who, it appears, may have been at Rudford Lock House in 1839 as his first child was born there. He was still at Oxenhall in 1851 when his family had grown to 5 children but there were also 3 lodgers (colliers who came from the Forest of Dean and must have worked in the pit at Gorsley). His pay would have been meagre with a wife and 5 children to support and any extra income from taking in lodgers must have been very welcome. Goodness knows where they all slept!


In May 1851 the canal was in the news when The Hereford Times reported that 2 boats going in opposite directions had met in the middle of Oxenhall tunnel in the middle of the night. Only recently a timetable had been devised to allow boats through the tunnel, one way for 3 hours and then the opposite direction for 3 hours. These times only applied during daylight hours so presumably the boat captains both thought that there would be nobody else about. Neither would give way and they were stuck there for almost 3 days before someone finally gave way. How long did it take Richard Goode to discover why there was no movement of boats in either direction on that fateful day? One can imagine him shouting up the tunnel, or even taking another boat in to try and resolve the impasse, but there would have been very little else that he could do but send word along the towpath to other boat captains to warn them of the stoppage.

In July 1853 the canal was in the news again when a local newspaper reported that a cloudburst over Dymock at 3am had caused the level of the water in the canal to rise so much that a boat became stuck in the tunnel and the crew had to be rescued by another boat! Richard Goode, who just happened to be out and about at the time, reported that the towpath was temporarily flooded and the water came up to the 3rd stair in his house.

However, given the local topography this is very hard to believe. The duties of a 'lockkeeper' were certainly varied and it meant apparently being on call 24/7.

Richard died in 1859 and by 1861 the lock was in the care of Thomas Godsall but he didn't stay long as John Preece must have taken over about 1863 when the first of his children was born in the lock house. JP was a Herefordshire man having been born at Withington and in 1851 was a canal labourer there who probably jumped at the chance of promotion and a house of his own. He was still at Oxenhall in 1871 and by 1881 his family had grown to 6. In 1876 he is recorded in David Bick's history as being paid £1.8s per fortnight - of which 4s was deducted as rent. His job in 1881 is described as "lock keeper (Inland Nav.)" which the transcriber has incorrectly written as "Inland Navy". It paints a picture of a gunboat patrolling the canal looking out for smugglers or illegal immigrants!

This isn't the end of the story so read about the Lock House under railway control in the next edition – and the debate about when is a house a cottage!

A NATURAL EXPLANATION?

In the last edition, John Chappell (another of our regular volunteers working to help restore the H&G Canal for the long-term benefit of local residents and the wider community) told us all about the benefits of Borage that grows wild in May at Oxenhall. But what are you likely

to find there in June . . .?

The plant Hemlock is synonymous with poison and as such was used in ancient Greece to put condemned prisoners to death. Its most famous victim was the philosopher Socrates and it was thought to be an ingredient of the witch's brew in Macbeth!

Hemlock's botanic name is *Conium Maculatum*. The plant is an herbaceous biennial with smooth green stems growing between 1.5-2.5m tall. The leaves are finely divided and lacy and the flowers, small,

white and clustered in umbels up to 10-15cm across (see inset), can be seen at their best in early June. When crushed both leaves and root emit a rank, unpleasant odour giving an easy means of identification. Often found on poorly drained soils, particularly near streams, ditches and other surface

water, the site at Oxenhall suits it perfectly.

Hemlock can be used as a sedative and pain reliever.

It is sometimes used as an ingredient in ointments for

haemorrhoids but the difference between a therapeutic and a toxic amount is very slight so don't try this at home. Overdoses can produce paralysis but rumours that the Yarkhill crew have overdosed on Hemlock have so far proved unfounded. The best antidote, if too much of this herb is taken, is said to be pure wine. Perhaps we should add some of this to our first aid kit!

Another volunteer Member makes a welcome debut contributing to The Wharfinger. Regular readers will know that the H&G CT has its own diesel powered stone cutting bench that is in regular use at Oxenhall - however, the engine was beyond its prime (to say the least!) - so what do we do . . .?

To, we have not suddenly gone anti-ecological but the temperamental overheating and engine which drove our large stone cutting machine was in real need of the sort of overhaul

that was beyond even the expertise of the skilled and resourceful volunteers Oxenhall.

It was time to call in the expert in the shape of one of the H&G CT's Vice-Presidents, David Prout. Those who attended the Grand Opening Ceremony of the completion of the first phase at Over, in September

2000, will have seen David's magnificent steam traction engine there - and many will know that in the 'day job' he owns Old Forge Garage at Dymock.

David came, listened to the 'patient' coughing and spluttering, and promptly removed it to his diesel treatment centre in Dymock. Sadly the patient proved to be in worse condition than expected and was pronounced ready for that great scrap-heap where all expired Petter Diesels lay redundant.

expedition to search for a replacement. Which is how the original green painted engine turned 'brown'. Hopes were quickly dashed, however, when 'brown' proved to have even less life than 'green'! 





The Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 but was not completed until 1845, making this the last major route built in Britain, but for the navigations of Birmingham and the Manchester Ship Canal. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, utilising some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. The Canal was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed by Dr Beeching in 1964.
