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
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# **National Recognition**



magazine, Waterways World, as one of the leading restoration projects in the country. The Waterways World Annual 2014 contains details of over 60 active restoration schemes and highlights five as leading the way nationally, of which the H&G CT is one. In the 2012 Annual we were one of the top ten "Canals of the Future", last year The H&G CT was one of only six that were brought to the fore and this year just five were judged to be "currently ahead of the field whether in actual progress or sheer ambition".

In April a major national conference "Bridges 2014" was held in Birmingham attended by civil and structural engineers, contractors and other specialists from the UK and abroad. Guest speaker after lunch was David Penny, who the organisers invited to speak following a suggestion by Gloucestershire County Council. David's presentation on how the H&G CT were approaching the restoration of the H&G

Canal, developing partnerships that facilitated not only the restoration of the Canal but also the provision of assets and other income streams to fund the long-term maintenance and management of the Canal, was very well received. Several potentially very useful contacts were also made.

The Canal and River Trust (CRT) held a well attended National Restoration Workshop in May bringing together canal societies and trusts, local authorities and the Inland Waterway Association. One of the objectives of the day was to "share best practice". CRT invited David Penny to be one of the speakers addressing the delegates and he explained our approach to restoration and the development of long-term income streams. His well received presentation included a video which CRT had filmed a few weeks before at THE WHARF HOUSE and Over Canal Basin.

Thank You Without doubt the H&G CT's latest high rating in the Waterways World Annual, and the increasingly high profile nationally, are a result of much hard

work by our Legal & Project Development Team, backed by the CoM and by the continuing work of all our volunteers both 'on the ground' and 'behind the scenes'. A most sincere 'thank you' to each and every one.

Finally my sincere thanks (as always) to Maggie Jones for the considerable time that she puts into each edition of The Wharfinger, ensuring that our design and production remains at a consistently high level. Many thanks also to John Hammond for acting as Deputy Editor for much of the material in this edition allowing me to go away and leave the laptop at home for the first time in many years!

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# A CoMplementary Relationship

From time to time members of CoM are asked about the relationship between \*\*\*Wharf House and the Canal Trust, and the contribution TWH makes to the H&G CT. The end of the 2013-14 financial year on 28 February provides an opportunity to offer an update.

In round figures, TWH made an operating surplus in 2013-14 of £65,000. This was its best year so far in spite of the bad winter, with widespread reporting that "Gloucester is flooded" causing much lost business – although TWH has never been flooded or cut off. The £65,000 was spent on:

Legal & Project Development Team £31,000 including staff employment, legal database, mapping software, office equipment, office costs, fees and expenses, energy, insurance

Over, Vineyard Hill and Leadon Valley sites and boats £10,500 including maintenance and development costs, insurance

Loan repayments £23,500

TWH is a wholly-owned asset of the H&G CT, both as the building and as a flourishing business. The fit-out of the building and development of the sites was in part funded through loans which are being repaid from TWH operating surplus.


RBS, the bank for TWH and H&G CT, recognises the asset value of TWH and the strength of its business and is content to use this as security and guarantor to the bank for substantial loans to the Trust – a considerable reversal of the position not that many years ago! These loans are to support other capital expenditure such as the purchase of Travellers Rest and our part of the costs of developing the Dymock site with Trust ownership of one of the houses. The objective, as with TWH, is that these projects are funded with the aid of loans, provide income which exceeds the loan costs thereby allowing the loans to be paid off over a period, increase in value due to the presence of the Canal, and yield a continuing income to

support further restoration and maintenance activity.

So much for the financial picture. TWH is seen by outside bodies as the headquarters of the Trust and as the place where meetings and discussions of major significance for the Trust take place and where the L&PDT—the Trust's centre of development—is based. Where better to meet a developer to discuss the next planning gain in association with a section of Canal restoration than in a venue which a previous developer provided under just such a planning gain...? The hospitality offered by TWH and the atmosphere of a secure, prestigious and professionally-run establishment play no small part in such successful negotiations.

None of this could happen without the success of TWH itself, not just financialy but also in being the public face of the Trust and a clear example of what working together with both development partners and the public sector can achieve. In the meantime we do not lose track of the here and now, and TWH presses on with some much more basic aspects of PR, from the annual Canal Festival to the establishment of the new H&G CT Facebook page and other PR initiatives, including of course the H&G CT Visitor Centre.

So WHARF House is not just a very successful, award winning Restaurant with Rooms but the functions hidden within it are also the very heart of taking the Trust forward to a strong and independent future, with increased assets and income and the ability to plan and drive forward the restoration and maintenance of the Canal for generations to come. It represents what is now held up as a national example of how a Charity can make itself self-sufficient and resilient for the long term.

### Legal & Project Development Team

at THE WHARF HOUSE

The LGPDT continues to go from strength to strength. We are pleased that our Legal G Project Development Assistant, Steph, has now completed her very successful internship which was 50%

funded by the University of the West of England, and she now joins us full time to help take key projects forward over the summer.

She will then continue part time over the winter while at University. The workload and opportunities for the H&G CT continue to increase with extensive land negotiations and project development in hand which promise an exciting future over the next couple of years and beyond.

#### Objective

The objective of the L&PDT is to continue to grow a strong asset base for the Trust which generates an increasing return to ensure we are a sound and strong independent Charity which can plan future projects with confidence and certainty. WHARF HOUSE is the first and most significant of these assets and its profits not only pay for all development and maintenance at Over Basin and Vineyard Hill and of the Heritage Boats fleet, but also for the costs of the L&PDT. TWH also provides accommodation for the L&PDT, pending construction of the Mill Barn, and it is the ideal venue for high profile meetings with development partners and potential sponsors. (See also page 5.)

#### **Fundraising**

The L&PDT has increasingly taken on the central fundraising role as well as securing

continued long term income from our assets. In this way the L&PDT secured financial contributions paid directly to the Trust in the year in excess of £35,000 and in addition TWH received direct financial support towards L&PDT from the University of the West of England and Peel Group. The L&PDT has two dedicated paid staff with support from TWH staff, and is led in a full time voluntary capacity with further part time voluntary support from structural engineers, a quantity surveyor, an architect and other professionals.

The purpose both of the development projects which are designed to bring in a continuing income and of the fundraising and promotion activities is to support restoration projects. Seriously large scale funding contributions can only be sought and obtained once we have both the land in hand and restoration schemes designed and ready to proceed. The more immediate demand is the substantial fundraising to allow acquisition of the land we need for the next sections of Canal identified for restoration. This makes the Land Fund absolutely fundamental to the future of the Trust and donations and bequests to this, and the offers of loans, really will make a crucial difference to our progress.

#### National Recognition

National recognition of the approach of the Trust, exemplified in the operation of the L&PDT, is growing all the time. Our determination to secure reliable continuing sources of income to fund restoration and then maintenance of the Canal indefinitely is celebrated as H&G CT leading the way. Too often, other bodies carry out restoration projects and then struggle to look after what they have created. Waterways World ranks us in the Top Five Canal Restorations nationally, and we have given presentations on how to restore financially sustainable waterways to bodies including the Institute of Civil Engineers and at national conferences including Bridges 2014 and the National Waterways Conference.

# **Aylestone Park**

As can be seen in the photos we now have all the concrete finished on the impressive new overflow weir (capacity 6.5 cubic metres per second) to serve the City Centre and Canal which will in due course discharge via new reed beds. These will scrub the water and lead to a net increase in the quality of water discharged from the City of Hereford to the Wye catchment.

Concrete work and sleeper deck complete.

Work is now in hand with volunteers to landscape the area around the weir, complete brickwork, install weir control plates, erect a hand rail and create the towpath during the summer and autumn. New planting will also be needed as well as general maintenance and weed clearing of the Canal on the site. 
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## **Moat Farm**

As always a variety of tasks have been undertaken over the last three months, with the skills and versatility of the Moat Farm team used to the full.

#### Towpath restoration

The task of recreating a continuous towpath throughout the site took a leap forward with the excavation of a further length. Once again our resident digger was employed to prepare a level 80-metre section around the bend towards the centre of the site. At 3 metres wide this greatly improves our access at this location. In keeping with our sensitive approach to vegetation management and, as we are not expecting any horse-drawn narrowboats any time soon, several large field maple, oak and ash trees have been retained on the towpath bank. Other removed tree stumps and roots have been saved to form a nearby stumpery.

#### Offside maintenance

We have been working our way along the offside bank carrying out limited scrub bashing and tree work. A few leaning or decaying hawthorn trees were removed and several reshaped to improve their appearance

and wellbeing. As the cut was full of water when this was done it was decided to fell the unwanted trees into the canal and rope-haul them out onto the towpath for cutting up. Paul and Ted looked after the felling and 'all hands' were then required for the hauling out. Our reward for this thinning out was a springtime display of several banks of cowslips which none of us recall seeing last year.

#### Planting regime

Most of the trees planted in late 2012 are doing well. The line of alders in the meadow is thriving in the damp conditions that prevail there, and the wild cherries provided a welcome floral display in the Spring. Back in November we were fortunate to be provided with some local native daffodil bulbs recovered from field ploughing near Dymock. These were planted around the site, marked with white pegs to prevent accidental disturbance, and many flowered in April. Not exactly the Chelsea Flower Show but it is hoped that over the years they will multiply and add a local flavour to the site.

#### South-end earthworks

Fuelled by the success of our last 'dumper week' in November it was decided to arrange a repeat. What are the chances of another completely dry week, this time in April? Well the forecast for the middle of the month looked promising and our team of six digger and dumper operators was blessed with a week of almost unbroken sunshine and, once again,

not a drop of rain. Working in pairs for seven days Wilf, Ted, Paul, Steve, Alan and myself were able to keep the machines fully e m p l o y e d developing the south end of the site.

Under a lovely blue sky, another load for reuse



The objective was twofold. Firstly to excavate 75 metres of the old track bed in order to lower the railway embankment to the towpath level. This would allow the desired width of canal to be cut whilst retaining a 3 metre wide towpath. Some 250 cubic metres of spoil was removed and relocated during this process reducing the embankment height by up to a metre. The embankment was originally constructed using a clay loam material topped with a blanket of small rocks known as pitching stones. This provided a firm sub-base on which the ash and track ballast was laid. Digging through the pitching stones was tough going.

Much of the ash and track ballast has been reused for towpath and access-way topping. Secondly, after setting out the line of the towpath and offside bank, excavation and profiling of the canal proper was commenced. More about this next time.

# New Site Dymock

A very long drawn out process on the legal and planning side is finally moving towards fruition. All the precommencement conditions were at last discharged by the Council in March allowing the housing development to start in due course.

The Canal and other aspects have been going through a near constant value engineering process to ensure all aspects of the site can be developed cost effectively. This has required considerably more support than

originally envisaged from

our engineers Tony Gee & new Cone
Partners and was made more
challenging than normal as our engineer,
Thomas Ashworth, has been working on a
major road scheme at Pulpit Rock on the
shore of Loch Lomond in Scotland and was
also flown down to the Dawlish Rail rebuild
to help on that! So our great thanks to the
team, and particularly Director Austin





Weltman, for the continuing support from the Stonehouse office.

Our thanks for their support and cooperation also go to the members of the Western Way Chapel who

> have kindly given consent for us to extend the Canal embankment across their boundary so that both our sites will be level rather than a huge gully being created between us. This agreement will

considerably improve the

look and ease of maintenance of the completed site and enables one the Canal to go virtually up to the boundary gaining us another 10m or so in water.

Canal Trust volunteers made a start on site in April by saving the daffodils that would otherwise be buried under the new Canal embankment and replanting them in an area which will not be disturbed. We will then replant these on the finished Canal embankment in the future. While on site they also cleared the Chapel boundary and installed a land drain on that boundary in preparation.

We hope to be on site in June installing over an acre of geogrid on top of the existing surface to reinforce the ground prior to our long term partners EMG/Keyway commencing the construction of the embankment itself.

## Annual Report for the year ending 28th February 2014

This is the twenty second Annual Report of the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust Limited [a non-profit distributing company formed in April 1992, No.2704407], which is a Registered Charity [1010721]. It replaced the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Society which was launched in 1983. It is also the report of THE WHARF HOUSE Company Ltd. [4627931], the wholly owned subsidiary all profits from which will be used for the promotion and restoration of the Canal. The Canal Trust is indebted to its Council of Management; during the period under review [year ended 28th February 2014] those listed below have been members.

The 12 months ended 28th February 2014 brought us a number of exciting challenges which after careful consideration Council of Management decided were absolutely the right thing for us to do to ensure the Trust continues to move forward. They are exciting opportunities as not only will they enable us to restore the line of the Canal but will provide an income for the future which is very much in line with our stated objective of ensuring we have resources for maintenance of each restored section of the Canal.

Our first opportunity involves restoring the line of the Canal in Dymock and as part of the project becoming the proud owner of a Canalside house which we can rent out to provide revenue for maintenance and support. Although we have been in discussions at Dymock for some time, as happens, it came to fruition at the same time as another exciting project, a pub for sale on the line of the Canal, an opportunity we really didn't want

to miss but still needed to be thought through and planned. We called on our procedures for approval where we need urgent discussions that involve all Council of Management. After much discussion about how we finance both projects, we took the decision that it was the right sort of project for our Opportunity Fund, and that we should also investigate a bank loan. The Travellers Rest will also generate income for us, whilst at the same time providing excellent publicity about the Canal. Our bank agreed with us and we are delighted to be able to say both projects commenced last year and will be in progress during this. H&G CT also made a loan to TWH which was the part of our organisation which made the purchase of the pub, allowing us to recover the VAT element of the purchase price. The loan is to facilitate cash flow while we are waiting for the VAT repayment from HMRC. This will work in a similar way to the loan made last year, again for cash flow reasons following expenditure by TWH at Vineyard Hill. which has now been repaid.

Thank you to all members who increased their subscriptions in line with last year's increase. There are still a small number of standing orders that need amending and those members will be contacted in the next few months. We are happy to report that income from membership this year exceeded our forecast and that our membership has increased by 13 to 1,332. We are also delighted to report that we continue to receive donations from members, including two anonymous donations of £10,000, and would like to thank everyone who has donated in this way for their generosity. In addition donations to the Land Fund this year totalled £2,610. We have also received donations from businesses and organisations: Churchdown Parish Council (£250), Lloyds Bank (£325), IWA (£375), Braunston Festival (£200). We also received from FoDDC on behalf of the SW RDA, Defra and the European Commission as part of the Rural Development Programme for England a grant of £19,595 to support the purchase of a tractor which will be used for maintenance at all of our sites. Our sites generated in excess of £3,500 through selling obsolete items and logs, as well as raising funds through Open Days and the Canal Festival at Over. We also sold redundant assets which brought income of £14,181 but no costs as

the agreement was completed by the Legal & Project Development Team. Expenditure was above the total budget agreed for this year, as we took the opportunity to work on the new projects mentioned above, without reducing our committed spend on our other projects.

Volunteer time worked for H&G CT was almost 3,228 days, an equivalent value of over £395,000. [Figures for individual restoration sites are given with each report. The significant balance is derived from all of the other volunteer time involved in the many activities supporting and promoting the H&G CT, including WHARF HOUSE.]

WHARF HOUSE continues to trade profitably having its best year to date despite the general difficult trading conditions in the economy. It continues to fund all planning, legal and project development costs. The expansion of our Legal & Project Development Team at "Wharf House was facilitated by continued, much appreciated, sponsorship from Peel Holdings/ Gloucester Quays. The Restaurant's AA Rosette and 4 Star rating for accommodation was confirmed for another year.

The H&G Sales and Promotion team made the most of the improved 2013 weather. Crick Boat Show and Braunston Boat Rally were very successful both financially and more importantly raised the H&G profile nationally. Local events were equally well supported with the small team giving many hours in preparation and attendance at these events. The Social evenings have been very well supported with members travelling many miles to hear a variety of speakers. The Wharfinger continues to attract high praise for both content and production; we are very grateful for the continued support from Print Plus and our regular advertisers. The Grand Holiday Draw raised a magnificent £3,079 for the Trust.

Restoration Site Reports: During the year many of our volunteers worked on several sites. In Gloucestershire at our Llanthony site, work continued with the maintenance of the cottages. The appalling winter rains exposed a leaking roof gully, which had to be repaired before damage was caused to the interiors. The programme for clearing the riverbank was carried out whenever river levels allowed and some general tree work was undertaken involving the removal of storm damaged limbs and tree stumps. Vegetation management and site drainage was a feature

throughout the year. A project to restore the old lock swing-bridge as an exhibit was also started. [110 Volunteer days = a value of £7,700].

At our Over and Vineyard Hill site work continued on restoration of the heritage boats fleet. All are now painted in H&G colours. A major hull leak on our trip boat Mr Maysey was successfully repaired. Work also continued on site development and enhancement activities. An old GCC sign post was refurbished and erected, an electric car charging point was installed in the car park, the site entrance railings were improved. and block paving around THE WHARF HOUSE was repaired. The site garden areas were maintained with much fresh planting, including osier beds. The new Kubota mini-tractor and flail were used to mow the grass and to help with clearing and mulching around the saplings planted along Vineyard Hill last year. Large numbers of native daffodils were planted alongside the Vineyard Hill towpath and the new donated bench was erected at the winding hole. Volunteers assisted the Vineyard Trust in clearing scrub from the ancient monument site and made a major contribution to refurbishing Travellers Rest for re-opening. The small Saturday team was also kept busy, the main focus being the gardens around THE WHARF HOUSE, undergrowth clearance in the car park and sanding down and re-oiling the tables and chairs on the terrace. The Over Basin and Vinevard Hill section of Canal are used regularly by Sailing4Disabled and by Gloucester & District Model Boat Club who assist in weed clearance, 1863 Volunteer days = a value of £64,450].

The second year has now been completed at Moat Farm and good progress made. Preparatory vegetation clearance of the Canal bed and towpath areas is complete and felled tree stumps have been removed. Sensitive vegetation management of the off-side has also been undertaken together with replacement tree planting throughout the site. Reprofiling of the canal bed and towpath has commenced. [215 Volunteer days = a value of £23,150].

The year at Oxenhall was spent in maintaining or improving what we have so far achieved. The spill weir which we repaired last year was found to be leaking so a decision was made to do a complete rebuild. A continuing programme was carried out on urgent tree maintenance; several have shed branches over the year, some even across the

towpath (but luckily no injuries), and work has been done to minimise the risks of recurrence. [256 Volunteer days = a value of £15,600].

In Herefordshire the Yarkhill team's work continued with regular site visits but considerable personal calls on members' time saw a significant drop in attendance. In addition to our core work at Yarkhill, work was carried out at Burcott Road, Hereford and assistance given at Kymin. [284 Volunteer days = a value of £19,900].

At Kymin East, planning the excavation continues to be a challenge. A drainage ditch has been completed for approximately half of the length, but the centre area is very boggy and the excavators were sinking in the quagmire rather than digging! The ditch is to assist with draining of the water within the canal corridor as there are a number of land drains feeding into this area. The adverse winter weather delayed the preparation work, and the plan, weather permitting, is to remove the last remaining large tree stumps in early March. [28 Volunteer days = a value of £2,400].

At Aylestone Park, the Contract to build the very major concrete 6.5cumec overflow weir for the Canal and City of Hereford was completed by Gardiners earlier in the year and handed to the volunteers to complete the brick facing to the Canal, fencing and landscaping works which will be completed over the summer.

At Burcott Road further maintenance took place to impove the site and an unrestored section of the Canal was temporarily let to Tudors builders' merchants while we await restoration in this area. [27 Volunteer days = a value of £1,350].

Sustainability: The H&G CT is committed to managing its activities in a sustainable manner wherever practical to do so. The photovoltaic cells at \*\* WHARF HOUSE continue to reduce our energy demands from the national grid and to generate (literally!) income for the Trust. Special key fobs ensure that there is no wasted energy within the guest accommodation when unoccupied and most lighting in the building is low energy — much having been converted to latest technology LED fittings. We continue to make good use of material reclaimed from the former hospital and all sites recycle materials wherever possible.

Legal & Project Development Team: The team has been exceedingly active during the year in handling all Legal work for the Trust as well as negotiating, designing, and developing new sites – some of which are referred to above and some of which will come forward in the coming years as most sites take years to bring to fruition. The Trust has never had so many sections in negotiation or so many exciting projects in hand. We are pleased to have had support for an Intern from University of the West of England which has proved so successful that the post has become permanent. A major focus has moved to fundraising to support projects currently in development – one of these was the delivery of a new Kubota tractor and other equipment for the maintenance team which saw the majority of the £24,000 cost secured through grants.

The Council of Management thanks all of our volunteers for the splendid effort and hard work which has been undertaken on the various projects along the line of the Canal and all of those who have worked at THE WHARF HOUSE, on the boats, on our promotional display and sales stand and to those who have assisted the H&G CT in many other ways during the year.

The CoM is also empowered to Co-opt Members during the year (subject to the maximum size not being exceeded).



## **Over Basin**

Incorporating Vineyard Hill

Over Basin has been subjected to mixed fortunes during the winter months. Large areas of the site have been severely flooded for long periods, and most members of the volunteer team have spent several weeks off site at the Travellers Rest assisting with the refurbishment work prior to the reopening (reported elsewhere).

The flooding over-topped the towpath at the beginning of the Vineyard Hill section preventing access, and the lower site area by the River Severn has been badly scoured by the rapid flow of flood water. However the damage will soon be repaired now that conditions have returned to normal.

On a positive note we have managed to continue the programme of work to maintain and restore the Heritage Boats which are



being upgraded to obtain Boat Safety Certificates, and a small team has also undertaken designing a traditional narrow boat hold cover for the open deck holds of Alder and Renton. Bosley has just been fitted with two splendid weather-proof for the temporary covers compartment air vents; these were fabricated by Terry using materials entirely from the scrap heap! Mr Maysey is having the electrical wiring extended and upgraded. and work is well under way preparing her for operation during the coming season.

Site routine maintenance has continued with repairs to the fencing around the lock excavation, the completion of THE WHARF HOUSE car park resurfacing, and clearing and

# Llanthony

The yew trees in front of the lock-keepers' cottages have become a significant feature over the years.

The scene of the cottages, taken in the winter of 1982, shows a specimen in the front garden of No. 2. Over the years these yew trees have matured considerably and, with their proximity to the building, have become far too large. One in particular has developed an unbalanced shape.

Mature yew trees are notoriously difficult to reduce in size on account of their complex branch structure. And so it was with due care that we approached the cutting back of the tree at No. 1 cottage. It was a case of gently does it until we had achieved the correct shape and the right amount of reduction. With Alan's patented "firestarter kit" a bonfire was soon ablaze and the unwanted scrub was burned.

Site restoration does not always involve diggers and dumper trucks. In the last issue of **The Wharfinger**, we reported our intention of restoring the old lock swing bridge. The swing mechanism consisted of a circular plate revolving on 6 rollers. The plate was discovered buried and the rollers had become badly rusted and pitted. New rollers were required. So it was off to the scrap-yard to purchase a 3ft length of 3" diameter bar (for £10) so that new ones could be manufactured. A great indoor job for a wet winter! The bar was cut



into 3" sections and new rollers are in the process of being turned.

## **Oxenhall**



The winter maintenance programme on trees finished with a flourish when it became urgent to pollard a large willow which was only about 10 years old but had grown to about 30ft and was leaning in the direction of our boundary fence and the caravans next door.

The problem with a tree out of vertical is that it will naturally fall the way it is leaning whether that is instigated by the wind or in our case by a man with a chainsaw. After much discussion it was decided to attach some ropes to the tree as high up as we could climb with a ladder and then attach the other end of the rope to our tractor and keep the

tension on as Bernard was cutting. About an hour later, after getting the saw jammed, the tree finally gave in and was pulled clear of the fence just before it hit the ground. It took the rest of the day to cut it up into logs and pile the brushwood up for a later bonfire.

It had been planned that a party of school students from Cheltenham would join us for a day to help construct a footpath through the woods at the eastern end of our site down as far as the old railway station at Newent, unfortunately it became necessary to call the excursion off as the ground was still too wet and slippery after the winter rains. Our volunteers have made a start on its construction now that the ground is drier and we still hope to have a day with the students later this year. This path will eventually open up as a permissive way for anyone to walk through and take in the delights of the Ell Brook running through woodland which is adjacent to the route of the old Canal.

The plans to move the Bailey Bridge are now taking shape once again and the TA soldiers are planning to come sometime this summer to undertake the job. It is taking a bit of organising and no definite dates have been fixed but we will get there in the end. An alternative path has been built to take the public footpath across the aqueduct. This will, of course, mean that the way will be clear for us to get on with the final concreting of the aqueduct arch which we started in 2012. Meanwhile work continues to complete the restoration of the lock spillweir.

The year started very wet although it has dried out now and the half mile walk at Vineyard Hill is back on the agenda! Our fleet of miniature sailing yachts usually means that there will be 10-12 racing at Over Canal Basin twice a month.

"Yes she could but no she is not!" Dave's superb steam tug is quite capable of towing Mister Maysey. The steam tug is a Caldercraft kit based on the tug Marie Felling. The Marie Felling was built in 1928 and arrived in Mombasa July 1929 to work on the Kenya & Uganda Railways. Hence she was painted white because of her life in the heat. Her delivery voyage was not without incident. While sailing too close inshore she ran into uncharted rocks. She was quickly beached and her damaged hull repaired.

The model of the tug is shown on her maiden voyage. She is powered by a four cylinder steam engine and has a boiler feed pump and water storage tanks. The steam boiler control regulating valve automatically adjusts the flow of steam based on temperature, pressure and engine requirements! This complete system allows for maximum efficiency which, in turn, enables long running.

#### Working with Nature

### **Purple Loosestrife**

One of the prettiest flowers growing at Oxenhall is Purple Loosestrife, botanically Lythrum salicaria. The plant has wide, natural distribution across north Eurasia and belongs to the Lythracae family that also gives us the Cigar-flower, a popular houseplant with bright scarlet tubular flowers.


Loosestrife is an herbaceous perennial and grows vigorously on the non-towpath side of the pound above the dam at Oxenhall. From a woody, congested root mass numerous erect stems grow to 1-1.5m tall, forming quite a significant barrier. The flower stems are square and of a reddish purple. Flowers, of a lighter purple, have six petals and twelve stamens and are clustered in tight tiers around the stem in the axils of the narrow, pointed leaves. Flowering lasts throughout the summer and, when pollinated, each flower produces a small capsule containing numerous tiny seeds. A mature plant can produce two million seeds in a season which are distributed by drift in moving water.

Favouring damp, poorly drained locations such as marshes, bogs and the waterside, Loosestrife will also tolerate drier conditions and variously coloured selections make desirable plants for the garden. The variety 'Feuerkerze' (Firecandle), with rose red flowers and fiery red leaves in the Autumn, is readily available and has gained the Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit whilst 'Blush', as the name suggests, has very pale, pink flowers on slender stems.

One of our late Autumn chores on site at Oxenhall is to cut down the rather ugly, dead brown stems. This benefits the following year's flowers which are an invaluable source of nectar for bees and hoverflies.

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



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# The Wharfinger

#### The Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 and reached Ledbury from Gloucester by 1798. In 1827 Steven Ballard was appointed to oversee completion of the canal, eventually reaching Hereford in 1845. making this one of the last major canal routes completed in Britain. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, with some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. It was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed in 1964.

#### The H&G Canal Trust

The Canal Society was formed in 1983 and in 1992 became the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity. The Trust has an ordinary and corporate membership of some 1,300 from all over the country and abroad!

Our objective is to fully restore the 34 mile Canal, from its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network at Gloucester to the centre of Hereford. We have major restoration sites in each county, which together extend to some 4 miles.
