Editorial by Cliff Penny

'JUST' CHALLENGES!

From the outset the H&G CT has adopted the approach that there are no problems, *just a series of challenges!*

These come in many guises and we do our utmost to overcome them as appropriately and effectively as possible. Hardly an edition of **The Wharfinger** goes by without a number being mentioned – this edition being no exception. The 'it's just another challenge' approach has served us very well over the years and usually gets us results – albeit exceedingly slowly at times.

The Wharf House, Llanthony Lock Cottages, The Travellers Rest public house and the soon to be built rental property at Dymock make a portfolio of assets that is unique amongst the 60+ active restoration projects nationally. These, together with the annual index-linked contributions from properties on neighbouring new developments (already secured at a number of locations as part of 'planning gain' negotiations in both counties) will combine to produce a sustainable long-term income for the H&G CT. This is essential to assist in the challenge of meeting the costs of maintaining and managing the Canal as each section is restored as well as after it has been completed – in perpetuity.

Readers will know that, following the sad death in hospital of one of our tenants of the Llanthony Cottages, a small team of our volunteers has commenced major improvements to that property. The H&G CT is fortunate that we have a number of volunteers who appreciate the importance of the H&G CT's policy of acquiring such bricks-and-mortar assets. The fact that they are willing to devote a considerable part of their 'Canal restoration' voluntary time and effort on repairs and improvements to our properties is not taken for granted. Please see Restoration Update – and an appeal for specialist trades assistance – on p.25. Interested in renting? Please see p.39.

Such assets do at times present additional challenges to those normally associated with canal restoration! For the third time since it opened **The Wharf House** has endured weeks of major roadworks on the adjacent section of the A40. Such major roadworks can (and do) wreak havoc on nearby businesses with little or no redress. The current works, to improve and install traffic lights at Over roundabout, should be finished by the time you read this. Despite the additional challenge of the roadworks, our hard-working team at **The Wharf House** remains on track to exceed previous annual trading records by the end of the trading year (28 February).

Yet another challenge is trying to ensure that the presentation and content of **The Wharfinger** remains at a high standard. We hope that readers will be happy with the 'refresh' of the internal pages – once again my thanks to Maggie Jones for all of her hard work on this, and for putting up with my many interventions!


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... a perspective from Council of Management

The H&G CT exists as a community: of volunteers, members and supporters of many kinds – individual, corporate and





Our volunteers are at the heart of our own community. Their contributions to our success are many. The articles you read in The Wharfinger are written by volunteers and the pictures are provided by volunteers; the material is edited, assembled and designed into the quarterly format seen here by volunteers. The advertisers support The Wharfinger, and thus the H&G CT, and the administration of their advertising is done by volunteers. The Wharfinger is printed at a much reduced rate by one of our long-term supporting companies, Print Plus. Last, but not least, the tedious job of envelope stuffing and the distribution of The Wharfinger, many copies by hand, is done by volunteers.

A similar story can be told about the other material we produce, such as leaflets about Membership, the Land Fund, Legacies, Canal Walks, which are all the work of volunteers. Volunteers also ensure our achievements are celebrated more widely by, for example, maintaining contact with and drafting articles for the national press. On a larger scale, the excellent new book on "the

continuing story of the H&G Canal", Rescued from Obscurity – which every member should own – was researched and written by a volunteer, Dick Skeet, with added material and many pictures contributed by other volunteers, designed and set into the form of a book by another volunteer, printed at a minimal rate by Print Plus, and with sales and distribution administered by yet more volunteers.

Dick served for a time as Chairman of the Council of Management, one of a long line of volunteers fulfilling this role, together with all the other officers and members of CoM in the past and today who are also volunteers. Those who represent the H&G CT in our relations with other bodies are also volunteers, as are those who promote the H&G CT at local and national festivals, our own Over Festival on the Canal and at other events by organising and staffing stands. Our online presence in the form of www.h-g-canal.org.uk is maintained by volunteers, as are the associated email distribution lists and the "Count me in" e-newsletters.

I emphasise all the above forms of volunteer activity because it is all too easy to fall into the mindset of considering only the more obvious and visible form of volunteering. This is equally important, but only as a part of the whole: the activity on our sites whether this is surveying, digging and profiling a new stretch of the Canal, constructing an essential part of the infrastructure, maintaining the towpath, vegetation and environment, improving the properties we now own, or sharing enthusiasm for our overall objective with visitors and passers by. Our teams of volunteers, whether focused on a specific site or roving between sites as work priorities demand, play a crucial role. The lengths of the Canal we have are a vital public face of the H&G CT, so what they look like and how they welcome visitors and draw them in is a major part of extending our community.

Of course, the sites we have would not exist were it not for the work of more volunteers, who over the years have fought for recognition of the H&G Canal, persuaded Councils to adopt policies protecting its line,

won arguments at public inquiries to defend future reconstruction, and negotiated arrangements with land owners and developers to secure those sites. That work continues, with an ever increasing demand as the number of sites and developments under negotiation grows, managed by volunteers and now supported by a professional team which is also active in gaining grants and other funding for the H&G CT.

So where does that money come from?

That professional team, essentially the Legal & Project Development Team, costs money, though remarkably little given the enormous workload it gets through. So where does that money come from? The answer, yet again, is through the efforts of volunteers. Through the energy and wisdom of many volunteers, the H&G CT has managed to build up a property portfolio. The Llanthony



Lock Cottages were bought through a legacy but have been greatly improved by volunteer work and bring valuable rental income to the H&G CT. Negotiations with Councils and developers have secured land which will one day become part of the Canal, and can meanwhile be let, and perpetual covenants from new Canalside properties also bring in an annual income. Fundraising activities run by volunteers add to donations large and small - most notably the mystery £100,000 we were given in 2012 - and all this contributes to project costs and supports land acquisition. But it is another part of the H&G CT which pays for the L&PDT. Built as part of a deal negotiated with the Council and developer at Over, following a hardfought public inquiry, then fitted out by volunteers, The Wharf House is both a property and a successful business wholly owned by the H&G CT. It is run by a board of directors who are volunteers and managed day to day by another volunteer, and it provides accommodation for the L&PDT and meets all of its costs, as well as the costs

associated with the Over site and the boats. The value of The Wharf House as an H&G CT asset is recognised by our bank, RBS, and represents the security to underwrite loans needed, for example, to acquire The Travellers Rest.

The commitment and energy of our volunteers draws in other voluntary contributions of many kinds from outside organisations, such as the Scout Network, the Ordnance Survey, EDF Energy and Balfour Beatty, the Royal Monmouthshire Royal Engineers and Sparrow Crane Hire (Gloucester), the IWA, Waterway Recovery Group, Stuart Group (Pumps) Ltd, E.B. Hayward & Co, Tony Gee and Partners, Gloucester Quays/Peel Holdings.

Awards for All Grant

Following the advance notice in the last edition of **The Wharfinger**, now that the embargo date on publicity has passed we are able to announce that a £5,900 grant has been secured for the H&G CT via the **Big Lottery Fund** 'Awards for All' scheme.


The project will consist of an integrated campaign to promote walking and cycling opportunities along and around the Hereford & Gloucester Canal, and to encourage the use of access routes to the Canal by bicycle and bus. The Canal already provides a number of picturesque walking routes (a number of which are the subject of H&G CT 'Canal Walk' leaflets) along what is a historically important local attraction. These and cycle routes will continue to be added to as the Canal is restored. The project will allow the canal to be enjoyed as a day out, with **The Wharf House** and dedicated visitor centre, adjacent to the restored Over Canal Basin at Gloucester, providing a great place to stay and/or for a meal or refreshments whilst exploring the Canal and surrounding areas.

With the funding we will build a bicycle store at **The Wharf House** which will enable cyclists to have a secure and free place to leave their bicycles should they wish. This facility will enable them to take a break during their ride, perhaps for lunch or coffee break, or just to enjoy the surrounding Canal on foot, with the knowledge their bicycle is safely stored. The H&G CT's existing CCTV system will be extended to increase security in the bike store area. Cycle stands will also be installed at **The Travellers Rest** public house, in Newent, which is also owned by the H&G CT.

The project will be promoted via a dedicated marketing campaign through third parties, new combined cycle and walking leaflets and new information boards at **The Wharf House**, **The Travellers Rest** and at Maisemore.





Three years have elapsed since our first visit to Moat Farm in late February 2012. The sum of the fortnightly visits amounts to 100 days, which, if worked consecutively would be roughly the equivalent of just three months on site! With an average attendance of six volunteers per visit it is remarkable what has been achieved and a good indicator of what is possible with a committed and competent volunteer workforce.


Virtually all the work has been undertaken from resources within the H&G Canal Trust, primarily with the Moat Farm regulars but with excellent support from members of the Yarkhill, Oxenhall, Over and Llanthony teams. We have had assistance from the **WRG Forestry Team** for aerial tree work, local land owner John Burton to remove a huge willow stump and a professional wildlife consultant to survey and report.



South-end in water

In the last edition of The Wharfinger Wilf Jones reported that the excavation and profiling of the south end of the site had been completed but unfortunately not all the photos were available. Some more photos of that process are shown here. Allowing some water through one of the dams ensured that the newly profiled canal bed was protected with about 30cm of water. Having taken great care to establish the position of the original puddle clay lining and not damage it during the excavation, it was heartening that the water level remained constant for several weeks. The real question was would it leak when full? Over 500,000 gallons (over 2 million litres) of water would

Winter maintenance

It was decided that during the winter period only minor site maintenance would be carried out. Nearly all the tree and scrub clearance had been completed in previous winters and large areas of disturbed ground had been sown with grass seed in the autumn which we were keen not to disturb. More tree planting took place with a range of indigenous species placed at suitable locations.

Our next main task is at the north end of the site which will involve re-creating the towpath excavating and profiling original canal bed over a length of about 100 metres. Work should commence once ground conditions




A number of the tasks outlined in the previous edition 122 of **The Wharfinger** have been successfully completed – despite the weather! The brick wall on the face of the weir has been finished, the weir plates fitted and the scaffolding removed.

This permitted the removal of the temporary dam which was put in the Canal during the construction of the weir. However the weather conditions at the time made the area a quagmire and thus the plan to complete the landscaping has had to be postponed. The proposed fencing and hedge planting will follow in spring of 2015 – weather permitting! It was also possible to re-arrange the security fencing to reduce the area fenced.

In mid November we were blessed with another spell of dry weather. This coincided with the dates we had agreed for a contractor with a 13 ton excavator to work on widening and deepening the drainage ditch which had been dug to help to drain the very wet middle section of the canal. This is necessary before the main excavation of the Canal can proceed.

The excavated material was spread on the towpath to build up low spots and to assist with the drying and, where possible, the offside bank was profiled.

Our dates for further work have to tie in with the farming calendar in order that we have the agreed adjacent disposal sites available between crops. The plan is to start pumping out the water in April, followed by a 10 day

'dig' in May 2015, starting from the Kymin end and working as far as possible towards the site of Barr's lock. Planning the details for this work is well under way. Also, the provisional planning has commenced for a 3 week 'dig' during July which we hope will complete the excavation of the Canal.

Let's hope we are blessed with fine weather on both 'digs'.

still being stored in one of our sheds. So as an unconventional temporary zero-cost improvement for the regular walkers of this section about 25 metres of old carpet were soon spread out – we now have the only carpeted footpath in the country!

Once the weather and ground conditions are more suitable the line of the footpath (and the adjacent route for our tractor) will have some spoil removed and hardcore will be spread on geotextile to provide a foundation upon which the final surface can be laid. Top soil will be laid, and the whole disturbed

area levelled and grassed so that later in the year there should be no evidence that there was ever a Bailey bridge here.

Help from Ordnance Survey

Last year saw the commencement of the construction of a path which will go along the old Willows nursery, through the woods alongside the Ell Brook and finish next to the old railway station at Newent. It has been 'on the back burner' for several months whilst we tackled more urgent jobs but we did have a very welcome offer of help for a day from the Ordnance Survey - who have helped the H&G CT in the past so this path was deemed an eminently suitable job for them to tackle. Eight younger and fitter guys than our usual volunteers spent a Tuesday December on the task and by the end of the day it was about 40% complete. We are very grateful to Ordnance

Survey for their help. The plan now is for us to complete the remainder and open up the path as a permissive way for members of the public to enjoy. There will be an Open Day here at Oxenhall later this year so that should provide an opportunity to follow the route of the canal a little further through some very pleasant countryside which has previously been inaccessible.

Tree Maintenance

We now have clearance from the Forest of Dean District Council to undertake necessary work on trees between the aqueduct and the lock. This has enabled us to get in and pollard some of the willows growing on the non towpath side. The work entails cutting through the trunk about 6ft above the ground and removing all the extremely long

branches - which break off anyway if left unchecked. Most of the trees have never been managed before so there is a lot of timber to deal with and it can take a couple of weeks to complete even one. Over Basin & Vineyard Hill Ted Beagles

Apart from all the usual winter site maintenance activities, trimming back the vegetation after an unusually vigorous year for growth, much time and effort has been spent during the last two months on dismantling the old lock gates which have been stored on site since 2002. This task is part of the main site area clean up in readiness for the future construction of the Mill Barn.

The gates are made of solid oak and it is proposed to incorporate this in the design and construction of the barn. All the lengths have been carefully stacked with separating pieces to ensure the heap is well ventilated so the pieces will dry out ready for use. Looking back at old pictures it is

interesting to note that the techniques we were using to dismantle them were exactly the same as those used 12 years ago to partially dismantle them for transport to site.

Dinghy Donation

We have been fortunate to receive a donation of a fibreglass rowing dinghy, complete with a trailer, from Mrs Sue Tring, a neighbour of one of our regular volunteers. Considering that it has lain unused in her front garden at Shurdington for many years it is in remarkably good condition. Following a quick check of the wheel bearings and some WD40 on the tow hitch we were able to tow it to Over. We are now checking and painting it before sending it on its way to a new home at the Moat Farm site. We are very grateful to Mrs Tring for donating the dinghy and trailer.

Heritage Boats

The front hold refurbishment of Renton is progressing well; all bare metal has now been treated with rust inhibiter and given at least two coats of paint. The concrete block ballast has been removed to enable the floor support timbers to be fitted; it will be replaced with steel blocks, as these will occupy much less space in the hold. Both Alder and Renton continue to be run regularly along the full length of Vineyard Hill, with the usual minor scrapes passing through the landslip area, which seems to be stable at the moment.

Our Christmas Lunch

The Toby Carvery, just down the road, was once again the venue for our annual Christmas lunch, along with colleagues from the Llanthony and Moat Farm sites. Numbers seem to be increasing each year with 41 people attending this year. Thank you to Pat and Belinda for arranging it all so superbly.

Llanthony

As reported last time, No 1 Cottage at Llanthony became vacant following the sad death, in early October, of our tenant Colleen Best – who had lived there since 1971.

It was quickly decided that the cottage should be re-let as soon as possible so that there could continue to be an income stream generated for the H&G CT. However, whilst we have carried out some works since the two cottages were purchased (in 2008 together with Llanthony Lock and the surrounding land from the former British Waterways), much needed to be done to bring the property up to a satisfactory standard.

A detailed survey was conducted to assess what was required, a comprehensive report was presented to the H&G CT Council of Management and an agreed programme put in place to carry out the extensive refurbishments. The plans involve the resolution of damp coming into the building (both rising and falling!), a complete kitchen and bathroom refit, the installation of a central heating system, and complete renovation from top to bottom. Some work items will have to be carried out by professional contractors, but a great deal can be handled by our volunteers.

To speed up the refurbishment programme we now have a work group every Tuesday (thanks to Martyn Tilford for his cooperation here in agreeing to suspend the alternating arrangement with Moat Farm) and each Saturday (thanks to the Saturday Over team who have responded brilliantly to the challenge).

Since the end of November we have concentrated on gutting the bathroom and kitchen, stripping wallpaper and rubbing down paintwork, removing lead piping from the water mains coming into the cottage and carrying out plumbing and electrical installations in preparation for the kitchen





Thank You

100 Field Squadron

In the last edition of **The Wharfinger** Brian Fox reported on the careful removal of the H&G CT's Bailey bridge from over the Ell Brook aqueduct to its new temporary storage position within our Horsefair Lane compound.

Our volunteers may have many skills, and we appreciate the assistance that we regularly receive from many professionals and organisations, but safely moving some 7 tons of Bailey bridge is not (yet?) within our capabilities!

One thing that we are renowned for is finding solutions to what at first might seem to be a



major challenge. It was decided to make a case to request that the work be undertaken by the Territorial Army as a "Community Service Collaboration" training exercise. One of our longstanding volunteers at Oxenhall, Geoff Hopper, produced an excellent report for our Council of Management, which then formed the basis of a formal application to the military, detailing two possible options for undertaking the work. This also identified all the necessary preparatory work and liaison to be undertaken by the H&G CT before the work could proceed.

The site was inspected and the project was subsequently agreed as a suitable funded training exercise to be undertaken by **The Royal Monmouthshire Royal Engineers** (Militia), the senior Reserve Regiment of the British Army. Its Regimental Headquarters is in the grounds of Monmouth Castle and at the nearby Vauxhall Camp, Monmouth. The approved work was to be undertaken in conjunction with a crane kindly supplied to the Sappers, with an operator, by **Sparrow Crane Hire (Gloucester)**.

The Royal Monmouthshire Royal Engineers (Militia) willingly gave advice when we first obtained the Bailey bridge, and provided a Staff Sergeant to supervise

the assembly and positioning of the bridge, so we particularly appreciated their further assistance now that it has served its purpose following our Oxenhall Team's successful restoration and strengthening of the Ell Brook aqueduct.

As briefly reported by Brian Fox in the last edition of **The Wharfinger**, at the beginning of September three days of hard work by men from **100 Field Squadron**, led by Captain Noel Brown, successfully completed the move. On the Thursday a small team of Sappers took delivery of three lorry loads of hardener supplied as part of

of hardcore, supplied as part of the exercise, and used an army machine to spread it ready for the arrival of the mobile crane. The following day more men arrived and the 35 decking plates were removed from the bridge - most being a sixman lift - and manhandled some 100 yards to the compound. The area around the bridge was then finally checked and cleared ready for the lift. The mobile crane, organised as part of the exercise in conjunction Sparrow Crane (Gloucester), duly arrived on the Saturday and the bridge was moved in 3 separate and careful lifts (the crane having to re-position due to the weight). The Sappers then flexed their muscles once again and carefully stacked the decking plates on the bridge ready for our next use.

'et another challenge successfully completed! Our sincere thanks to The







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Working with Nature John Chappell

Violets

Roses are red, violets are blue ... so goes the little ditty of childhood – except at Oxenhall it seems as all the violets there are white! This, and the plants' habitat, gives a clue to which species of violet this is.

Most of the violets we see growing wild in the countryside are commonly referred to as the Dog violet. As with the wild rose the word 'dog' seems to be applied disparagingly to indicate the plant is so abundant as to be worthless. You could be forgiven for thinking Viola canina would be its botanic name, but no, and I had better explain this carefully.

The true Viola canina dislikes shade and grows in acidic open uplands, hardly descriptive of the Oxenhall setting. It is also known as the Heath Dog Violet and does not occur in a white form. The leaves of V. canina are twice as long as they are broad, quite different from the plant at Oxenhall which can be found tucked under a shady hedge or in the grass by the side of the towpath.

No, the plant growing at Oxenhall and illustrated here is 'V. riviniana', the specific name commemorating Augustus Rivinus (1652-1723) a German botanist who was the first to classify plants according to the structure of the flowers, a method adopted later by none other than Linnaeus himself. Flowering from April to June, the leaves of V. riviniana are heart shaped, smooth, with regularly spaced indentations around the edges; it is well suited to the conditions at Oxenhall. Both leaves and flowers are edible but being an important food plant for various fritillary butterflies perhaps they are best left alone for the caterpillars to enjoy!

Plants devise wonderful strategies to ensure their seeds are dispersed widely and the

viola, the family to which violets belong, is no exception. Seed capsules on all violas open into three separate 'gutters'. Each gutter has two rows of seed and when the sides of the gutters begin to dry they curl backwards catapulting the seeds out one by one. This may not be the end of their journey as ants, enjoying an oily excretion on the seeds, will drag them further away. A belt and braces form of seed dispersal!

Neither V. canina nor V. riviniana are scented; that attribute is held by V. odorata. Victorians used the leaves and flowers of this species for cosmetics and perfume and plants were widely cultivated, especially in Devon. Come the Second World War, when land was requisitioned to grow food, scented violets went out of fashion and V. odorata all but disappeared. Today they are making a comeback and conservationists and enlightened nurserymen are reintroducing this nostalgic, tiny flower into cultivation.

In the meantime we can enjoy the flowering of the white violets at Oxenhall, which even though lacking perfume, still remind us it is early spring and that summer is not far away.





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The Wharfinger

The Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 and reached Ledbury from Gloucester by 1798. In 1827 Steven Ballard was appointed to oversee completion of the canal, eventually reaching Hereford in 1845, making this one of the last major canal routes completed in Britain. The canal stretched for 34 miles from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to the city of Hereford, with some 22 locks and 3 tunnels. It was formally closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury to Gloucester railway which in its turn was closed in 1964.

The H&G Canal Trust

The Canal Society was formed in 1983 and in 1992 became the Herefordshire and Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity. The Trust has an ordinary and corporate membership of some 1,300 from all over the country and abroad!

Our objective is to fully restore the 34 mile Canal, from its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network at Gloucester to the centre of Hereford. We have major restoration sites in each county, which together extend to some 4 miles.
