

Editorial by Cliff Penny

A successful approach!

Writing in the January edition of Sou'Wester, the regional magazine of the Inland Waterways Association, Regional Chairman Roger Holmes briefly mentioned Newent Station and said the H&G CT "always have a surprise with their imaginative ideas".

In a recent email to all local IWA members, IWA Branch Chairman Martin Turner said the H&G CT was "one of the most innovative in the UK." Add a couple of longer-standing quotes: "Sheer dogged determination and tenacity" (Jonathan Mosse writing in The Times Waterways of Britain) and "An inspirational Waterways Trust" (Clive Aslet, Editor at large, Country Life Magazine writing in The Telegraph) and you will quickly appreciate that, what I frequently refer to on this page as our "different approach", has created the H&G CT quite a reputation both locally and nationally!

So it's good to start the New Year with three H&G CT "different approach" successes! Years of complex, and at times seemingly endless negotiations, by our Legal & Project Development Team have resulted in an important short part of the essential diversion route for the Canal being completed close to the heart of Dymock. Our successful partnership with Dymock Parish Council, the Housing Association, landowner Tomack Developments and the longstanding support for H&G CT from Keyway, has produced significant and long lasting benefits for the village and the H&G CT. See page 8.

As regular readers will know one of the mainstays of the H&G CT's "different approach" is our commitment to do our utmost to ensure that we have sustainable income to manage and maintain various lengths of the H&G Canal as it is restored/reconstructed. Our (increasing) 'bricks and mortar' assets play an important role in this; however, all these valuable assets also require maintenance! At Llanthony the small team of our own volunteers (with occasional specialist assistance) have gone way beyond maintenance and literally transformed the largest part of the Llanthony Cottages. H&G CT has a far more valuable asset with a significant increase in rental income such that all the costs will be recovered within some 15 months. It is one thing putting all this time and effort into extending or maintaining/improving your own home - quite another for volunteers to have done all this for the benefit of the H&G CT. See page 14.

In Hereford we reported in 2010 that the redevelopment of the Holmer Trading Estate had been granted planning permission, the key part of which was the reinstatement of the adjacent section of the H&G Canal, but the developer subsequently failed to proceed. This short length will be one of the most difficult and expensive to reinstate as it is buried in a deep cutting infilled with factory wastes requiring specialist disposal. At Herefordshire Council's January Planning Committee both the Officers and Councillors very clearly demonstrated their commitment to our "different approach". A new permission was granted accepting the case that, to be economically viable to the developer, the only way to achieve the reinstatement of the Canal through the site was to grant permission on a rare 'exception' basis of 100% 'open market' properties. ... a perspective from Council of Management

Allour H&GCT members, individuals, families or corporate, whether 'armchair' or active as a volunteer, collectively form one of the greatest assets for H&G CT. A strong membership gives us high credibility in our relationships with regulatory bodies, influential persons and organisations such as Canal & River Trust, other canal restoration bodies and the media. It is also an important factor in our applications for support from various grant-giving bodies and sponsors, both corporate and individual.

Many of our members are also remarkably generous. This applies particularly to specific causes, of which the most recent is construction of the Mill Barn. The £10,000 anonymous donation made for this purpose by a member in 2013 has now, following the appeal in the last issue, been more than matched with over £14,000 being donated by early February. And these amounts are almost all eligible for gift aid, so will be boosted by 25% from HMRC in due course. These contributions become even more valuable when we apply for grants, as a condition for these is often that we can demonstrate strong community support through matched funding. We are immensely grateful to these donors.

Since taking on the position of Treasurer, I have been analysing payments into the H&G CT's account. Large numbers of these are annual membership renewals, most made by standing order, others in the form of cheques or cash. A welcome number of members routinely add a donation to their subscription – thank you to each one of you. If you don't do this but could afford it, please consider



following this generous path. As has been said often before, "It All Counts". Whether we like it or not, and however much effort many volunteers make with bucket and spade (or more realistically with

excavator, dumper, mower...), promoting H&G CT at shows, or at a desk pursuing all the other essential aspects, canal restoration requires a lot of money, both capital sums and a secure income.

On the subject of volunteers, when you became a member, we asked if you were able to offer us skills or had the time to assist in any way. Our Membership Secretary always follows up all such offers. A substantial number of our members do contribute their time, skills and knowledge in important ways to support our cause and we fully understand that others simply do not have the time, or do not wish to become any more involved. But maybe your circumstances have now changed and you are able to get more involved but haven't got round to it? Please get in touch ideally by sending a brief email, title Volunteer, to volunteer@h-g-canal. org.uk. Include your name and location together with brief details of how you might be able to assist H&G CT. If you don't have access to email then please send the details by post (clearly marking the envelope "VOLUNTEER") to **The Wharf House**. We look forward to hearing from you.

2015 placed heavy demands on H&G CT finances. We have invested in major ways: extensive refurbishment of the larger Llanthony Lock cottage and of Malswick House, construction of the Canal at Dymock and our new house there, and large-scale excavation and restoration at Kymin. At the same time we have not benefited from rent from the larger cottage or profits from Malswick House. Malswick House is now trading successfully and both cottage and house will be bringing in rent. H&G CT will also receive a percentage from the sale of the five houses at Dymock plus the start of annual payments by these properties. So prospects look far more promising this year.

It is worth adding that we would not have been able to achieve what we have without the very large contribution made by **The Wharf House Co Ltd**. On its own TWH restaurant and rooms business makes a large surplus, which is used to benefit the Trust. In 2014–15 a surplus of some £65,000 was spent in the approximate proportions of £51,000 to pay for all the work and staff costs of the L&PDT, £6,000 to pay for all work at the Over and Vineyard Hill sites and to the boat fleet, and £8,000 to reduce the remaining loans from the construction phase of **The Wharf House** which now amount to less than £24,000.

This is all good news. With your help, it can be even better!

L&PDT News The Holmer Trading Estate scheme ...

DEVELOPERS TO RESTORE CANAL by David Penny

A number of times over recent years we have reported the granting on planning permission in 2010 for the redevelopment of the Holmer Trading Estate including the restoration of one of the most difficult sections of the H&G Canal as an integral part of the proposals. Due to market conditions and economic considerations the previous developer did not implement the various approvals.

The H&G Canal runs along the edge of the Holmer Trading Estate in a cutting on the approach to Aylestone Tunnel. The ¼ mile long Tunnel was found to be in remarkably good condition during a specialist full diving survey in 1995. However, the ¼ mile length of deep approach cutting is fully infilled with tipped industrial waste which requires specialist disposal. It will be one of the most expensive short sections of the H&G Canal to restore.

New site owners Codex have been working closely with the H&G Canal Trust to bring forward further revised proposals for the redevelopment of this old trading estate. As with all the previous proposals as an integral part of the development, the Canal will be excavated and fully restored from Aylestone Tunnel right up to our first phase restoration at Aylestone Park. On completion the newly restored length of the Canal, and 1/4 mile tunnel, will be transferred to H&G CT. There will also be perpetual (index linked) payments to H&G CT by all of the new properties for the restoration and long-term maintenance and management of the H&G Canal. The adjoining section in Aylestone Park will subsequently be widened by H&G CT to modern day requirements (the new slipway and major storm overflow constructed as part of our first phase works

having been positioned to accommodate this). Together, these lengths will form a fantastic section of restored H&G Canal within the City.

So why are we far more confident that this developer will proceed?

Because in January the Planning Committee of Herefordshire Council took the exceptional step of approving the development with all the properties being for sale on an 'open market' basis and with the H&G Canal being the major benefactor from the considerable 'planning gain' on this development. The determination to see the H&G Canal restored through this site shown by both Officers and Members was exceptional (in all senses of the word) and has given the developer an approval with the greatest potential for an economically viable scheme.

The clear vision of the Council to see the Canal restored is greatly welcomed and shows fantastic support for the huge voluntary effort along the Canal to date. We also welcome being able to work with developers from the outset of schemes and these proposals will make a huge improvement to the area.

FIRST PHASE DYMOCK COMPLETED! by David Penny

The Challenge ...

Dymock Parish Council wanted affordable housing to keep Dymock a vibrant community and ensure the survival of the village school (and other facilities including the community owned public house) plus a new car park to meet a long-standing severe shortfall in the village. The H&G CT wanted to start reconstructing the Canal through the village (on a long-identified essential diversion route) and a new play area created to partly replace one on the diversion line elsewhere in the village and a new footpath to the church and pub. There was no suitable site for an

economically viable housing development within the village development boundary.

A partnership of H&G CT, Dymock Parish Council, the Housing Association and landowner Tomack Developments succeeded in eventually obtaining planning permission for a 20 house development on an 'exception' basis (solely because it facilitated the reconstruction of the H&G Canal) even though it was outside the normal development boundary. It was approved thanks to exceedingly strong support from Dymock Parish and Forest of Dean Councillors.

The Outcome ...

Benefits for Dymock:

- 14 much needed affordable new rental properties run by the Housing Association
- availability of the detached rental property owned and run by H&G CT
- 5 'open market' waterside homes (which are selling fast!)
- a new 20-space car park
- a new pedestrian access to the church and Beauchamp Arms creating better footpath links
- a new play area to replace one partly blocking the route of the Canal.

Benefits for the H&G CT:

- a short length of the Canal completed close to the heart of the village
- the freehold of this short length of the Canal (on an essential diversion route)
- a percentage of the sale price of the 5 'open market' properties
- perpetual (index linked) income from

- each of these private properties towards the restoration and long-term maintenance and management of the Canal in the area
- rental income from H&G CT's new detached 3 bedroom waterside property.

Our successful partnership with Dymock Parish Council, the Housing Association and particularly the support of landowner Tomack Developments and the ongoing support from Keyway has produced significant long lasting benefits for the village and the H&G CT. All the time and effort in pursuing our 'different approach' has brought long-term benefits not just to the H&G Canal but also to the community.

The support and understanding of Dymock Parish Council and many of the residents has been of tremendous assistance throughout. We look forward to a continuing partnership with the Parish Council on subsequent phases to complete the Canal through the village.

After many months of concerted volunteer effort, the refurbishment of the house has been completed and it is ready for rental.

Externally, the refit has involved repairs to the roof and chimney flashing to ensure the building is watertight.

As has been reported in previous editions of The Wharfinger, internally the property has benefited from the installation of a new kitchen and bathroom. Special attention has been given to the upgrade of the insulation and a set of new storage heaters has been provided. Much of the electrics and plumbing has been replaced and the house has been decorated and carpeted throughout.

Wherever possible the old features have been retained, for example, the very attractive cast fireplaces have been restored to their former glory. In the downstairs lounge, the removal of a faulty back boiler revealed the location of an inglenook fireplace (sadly long since gone) but we were able to make an interesting feature out of the former alcove.

In the summer months, with the better weather, we will carry out some further improvements to the exterior, but this will not impinge upon the H&G CT's ability to rent out the property.

The rain held off long enough for us to complete the remaining tidying up of the canal bed. Our efforts were then transferred to clearing around the ditch bank hedge saplings planted several years ago.

The Team then had two 'away days'. The first saw a contingent of eight visit a very wet and muddy Dymock and complete the tree planting on the embankment. This was followed three weeks later when nine members

represented the Yarkhill Team at **Malswick House** for the volunteer's Christmas gettogether.

Surprisingly it was not until just before Christmas that any water was to be seen in the canal but by early January rainfall provided some two to two and a half foot depth of water along the whole stretch.

Dymock

In driving rain over two days in mid-November some twenty Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal Trust volunteers were joined by local residents to plant hundreds of trees along our new Canal at Dymock.

The 500 trees comprise a variety of native trees including oak, beech, bird cherry, field maple, spindle, sweet chestnut, birch, hazel and alder. The banks to the new Canal are steep and the roots will give good support once the trees have become established. As well as providing invaluable habitats for birds and insects the rich variety of colours will add interest to the area, particularly in the autumn.

After the very successful Open Day in September our thoughts turned to vegetation and what there was to do before the start of nesting in March.

The mild weather meant that grass cutting continued until the beginning of December and as I write in early January it could do with another cut already! It's not just the grass that keeps growing but the daffodils are well up and the birds will be confused into thinking about building nests soon if we don't get a cold spell. Our main effort has been on the old Willows nursery where we have cut, strimmed and burned most of the brambles which have occupied the site since H&G CT bought it 12 years ago. We found that the most efficient way of clearing was to cut and leave where they were and then come in with the tractor and bulldoze everything into a pile for the bonfires. The area is now clear for a detailed survey to take place of the design and exact position of the embankment on which the canal will run.

Attention has now shifted to continuing with the pollarding of willow trees which we didn't have time to complete last winter. Six very large branches all growing from the same stump are now being tackled and will probably take a week for each one so that will just about take us up to the end of the season. Each trunk is chainsawed off and then pulled up onto the bank with the tractor so that it can be logged and trimmed - plenty of willow logs now available! The only problem might be the extremely wet ground which prevents the tractor moving about without chewing up the soil and making a mud bath. The members of the public who enjoy walking the path would, understandably, not be happy so the work

is 'on hold'. Give us a few hard frosts and no problems.

An inspection of the footbridge over the lock revealed several of the cross timbers were rotten and these were replaced as a matter of urgency. A full inspection will be done when the weather is warmer and the timbers have had a chance to dry out. It was built in 2004 and has been treated a couple of times but clearly not enough – another job to go on the list.

The tractor service was completed by Geoff and Ian thus saving H&G CT a few pounds but the cost of new parts and oil required still came to over £300. This is money well spent as we would struggle to get things done efficiently without our tractor. Bulldozing brambles and nettles was a new usage but moving heavy stones and logs, as we are now doing, plus the pallets of used bricks from the station platforms is the bread and butter work.



Permissive Path

The permissive path that we have been creating from the public footpath by the aqueduct down through the Willows and on to the former railway station is now complete. It was necessary to build some steps up from the Ell Brook to the station so unfortunately it is not wheelchair friendly. Eventually it will be possible for the less able to reach the former station along the canal towpath on the proposed embankment which will then merge with the existing railway embankment with no locks in between. Signs and information boards at strategic points are planned to guide you along and to explain why it has to be done this way. From the station it is a short walk into Newent for a cup of tea.

The Old Platforms

I have previously reported on our work to clear away the rubbish between the platforms of the old station and we have now transported all the remaining building materials which were still in the way some useful building materials have been sold, some sold for scrap or recycling; as little as possible has gone to the tip.

A start has now been made by the Saturday volunteer group working alternate weekends on clearing a strip about 2-3ft wide along the top of both platforms revealing what is still left. We have already discovered that every single coping stone which finished off the platform edges has been taken(well over 1000) and we will necessarily have to replace them if we are to do the job properly.

Bringing in the Experts!

Some experts from the Waterway Recovery Group specialist Forestry Team paid us another welcome visit one day in December to do essential work on the large fir trees by the station embankment. We believe they were planted soon after the railway was built so they are about 125 years old and about 100ft high. Two years ago one fell and it is essential that we inspect them regularly and carry out essential safety management otherwise others will fall. This involves clearing much of the ivy from the trunks and trimming dead branches as necessary and, as a last resort, it may mean felling a small number. The trees have a Tree Preservation Order on them and before any pruning or other work can be done H&G CT has to obtain authorisation from Forest of Dean Council. WRG Forestry will be back to complete the work in February. »» BF

firm to carry out extensive refurbishment of the pins and bushes on the boom, dipper arm and associated hydraulic rams. This involved dismantling and machining several components and took several

freezing January morning.

several components and took several weeks. The work was carried out to a high standard and the machine was returned in

mid January.

A further length of the centre section of the canal bed was prepared for dredging and profiling using the excavator. However a long dull and wet period ensued meaning that ground conditions became far from ideal for further heavy machine work.

Our regular volunteer team enjoyed

a quiet winter period by Moat Farm

standards. On-going site mainten-

ance tasks were carried out including

regular grass-mowing and light

vegetation management.

It was decided to take our resident excavator out of service over the midwinter period and get a local engineering As the water levels were high following heavy rain in late December and early January only some light excavator work was possible in the drier areas of the site. The planned dredging of the remaining centre section will have to wait until the water levels reduce.

Heritage Boats

All the boats continue to be run and maintained regularly, and routinely sail along the full length of canal to ensure they remain in a serviceable condition, and continue to keep navigation past the landslip area along Vineyard Hill section clear. The motor problem on Bosley has now been resolved and permanent modifications made. The cabin exterior is being refurbished by Pat when weather conditions permit.

The work on Renton's front hold cover is proceeding well; the design is based upon the restored narrowboat "Northwich", one of the floating exhibits at Gloucester Waterways Museum. Several visits were made and photographs taken and sketches made of main structures comprising of several "A" frames and upright supports with a broad "walking board" across the top. All the main components have now been fabricated and assembly is about to begin. This has been done in a pressure treated timber, as the cost would have been prohibitive in oak. A successful trial fit has been carried out in advance of the final erection. Once it is completed it will be painted black. Northwich has a traditional three part cover over the hold:



along each side are two narrow covers which are secured and sealed to the hull of the boat at the base; they are then joined together and tensioned by ropes passing over the walking board. A very much larger third section is then placed over the board, overlapping the lower covers by about 450mm, and secured to the edge of the boat to prevent wind driven rain entering the hold. We are currently researching the most cost-effective method to procure such a cover. In the meantime after completion of the frame a temporary cover will be put in place to keep rain out.

Once all the woodwork has been completed and painted we are intending to paint the end panels with a traditional Roses and Castles design, and would welcome advice and suggestions for the design and offers to undertake the painting. My contact details are inside the back cover.



Beagles

The Great Wall

Work on the great wall continues, with more than half of the reinforced concrete work completed. Shuttering is now in place for the penultimate pours. These vertical sections have been very labour intensive due to the more complex supports required to support the shuttering under the high loading arising during concrete pouring. Work was

interrupted briefly in November when a family of swans passed by 'in formation' on the river Severn!

Following completion of concrete work, which is imminent, we shall move on to cladding the whole structure with reclaimed bricks, and finally constructing the bicycle 'cave'!

Pump Rescued

The level of the river Severn has been very high recently, and although (so far!) the site has not actually been flooded we decided to move the Stuart pump (used for topping up the canal from the river

Leadon) to the higher ground of the main site for safety. This was accomplished on one of the rare sunny days in the last week of December with the help of the volunteers from

Llanthony site. This proved to be a more difficult task than originally envisaged! The ground around the pump was very soft and muddy and the towing vehicle immediately went into a four wheel spin and could not move. Luckily we had a second four wheel drive vehicle on site at the time, so we positioned this on the hard surfaced road, and attached a long tow rope between the two cars, and gradually the pump was hauled away from the river bank, and towed to the safety of the main site area. On a high tide three weeks later the flood plain was completely flooded so all our work was not in vain. »» TB

News from the friends of Gloucester WATERWAYS MUSEUM

In November 2015 the Museum closed for the refit. A team of enthusiastic volunteers attended to started to decant all the collection display items to a safe place of storage away from the two floors being refitted.

The works progressed smoothly and were completed well within the time period allowed with the new position of each item being recorded. 



In early November the fishermen had a bevy of wonderful catches. They thanked us for driving the fish in their direction!

The Friday Micro Magic racing is still the most popular event. We have had eighteen sailors turn up for some meetings. One of our sailors, now retired, has presented two shields for the winter and a summer ladies competition; normally five ladies compete.

Bryan's MTB 49 was launched in 1941 but was not successful. Her top speed of 26knots was nowhere near that of her counterparts. The model's hull is a fibreglass moulding, the super-structure and fittings are from plasticard.

Wot No Otters?

The River Leadon at Over has become more prone to silting since the discharge into the Severn became a tidal creek after the Environment Agency cut off the flap valves.





Our objective is to rebuild the 34 mile Canal linking the centre of Hereford to Gloucester and its connection with the 2,500 mile inland waterway network. We have major restoration sites in each county, together extending to some 4 miles. The intention is to provide a financially sustainable independent Canal which does not require public money for its future operation and maintenance.

The H&G Canal Trust

The Canal Society, formed in 1983, became the Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity, in 1992. It has an ordinary and corporate membership approaching 1,400, here and abroad.

The original Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 reaching Ledbury from Gloucester by 1798. In 1827 Steven Ballard was appointed to oversee the Canal's completion, which reached Hereford in 1845; this was one of the last major canal routes completed in Britain. The Canal stretched from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to Hereford, using 22 locks and 3 tunnels. It was closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury-Gloucester railway which in turn closed in 1964.
