

Editorial by Cliff Penny

Into the Future!

The formation of the Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal Trust in 1992 came about following a detailed presentation we had given to senior local authority staff from both counties a few years earlier.

They advised that a charitable constitution, compared to that of an unregulated society, would enhance our credibility with the general public, local and national businesses and public bodies. In particular it was necessary to gain the local authority support for the essential protection of the route of the Canal that we subsequently achieved.

I wrote in **The Wharfinger** that it was "the correct foundation stone on which our further success can be confidently built . . . it marks a major step in the history of our endeavours." I stressed that the charitable status required us to change some things to comply with the law and presented an opportunity for us to improve our organisation so that it was fit to help us deliver our long term objective.

It has been stressed that the physical act of rebuilding the Canal is, at times, almost the easiest bit – like an iceberg there is much more going on out of sight! The creation of the Legal & Project Development Team in 2012 marked another significant landmark in the organisation of H&G CT to try and meet increasing demands. The L&PDT has subsequently benefitted from a growing list of skilled professionals acting on a voluntary, pro bono or nominal cost basis. However, at times progress is not as swift as we would like due to the manner in which CoM is currently structured.

As reported previously CoM have been receiving professional advice on the implementation of major changes to the organisation and management of H&G CT – building on proposals discussed some 4 years earlier. CoM has decided to restructure H&G CT management into two tiers to improve operational effectiveness. In addition to a board of trustees ("Council") an Executive Board will manage day-to-day activities on behalf of Council. The first step is the appointment a chief executive to work with CoM to refine ideas for the new structure (see pages 4 and 5).

Whilst it is of little significance in the overall scheme of things I can lay claim to having been the last Chairman of the Canal Society and the first of the H&G CT. Just as we recognised the need for change back in 1992 quite clearly it is now time to implement further changes to our organisation to more effectively meet current day and future demands. As always, progress will be reported in The Wharfinger.

Regular readers will be aware that our longest ever serving Chairman Janet Moult (8½ years in total) announced at the AGM her intention to 'retire'. However, that doesn't mean that Janet has left us – far from it – she continues as Chairman of H&G Canal Sales & Promotion and is responsible for many other tasks! Thank you, Janet (see page 21).

CoMpelling reasons for change ...



... a perspective from Council of Management

As readers of Editions 128 and 129 will know, Council of Management has been engaging in a review of the organisation and management of the H&G CT. This started in March 2016 when CoM accepted the offer to lead a review by HR consultant and H&G CT member (and volunteer) Clive Weston.

Discussions in the first two workshops led by Clive have focused us on our review about the way H&G CT operates. In particular, CoM members have considered the vision for H&G CT and the associated mission, in terms of the measures needed to make progress towards achieving the vision. We have also considered the many challenges H&G CT faces in accelerating that progress. Our review has convinced us that now is the time to step up a gear!

The Canal Society, and then the H&G CT, has been active for a third of a century. In that period it has built firm foundations in establishing itself in the two counties as a credible organisation and restored some four miles of the H&G Canal, a major achievement.

As our regular readers know it has also:

- Secured protection of the entire route in local authority plans together with important supportive policies enabling significant 'planning gain'
- Consistently been successful in representations to public inquiries and hearings
- Successfully worked in partnership with local authorities, parish councils and their communities, landowners and developers to deliver much more than just restoration of the canal

- Acquired freehold land and property including securing the means of access to the waterways network at Llanthony
- Developed capital assets and sources of perpetual income to support restoration and maintenance into the future
- Been consistently placed within the top 5 of 65 active UK inland waterway schemes in the annual review by a leading national waterways magazine.

Janet Moult, our long standing chairman, announced at the AGM that she wished to step down before the end of the year, and that took effect at the end of October. That leaves an important post to be filled.

CoM has decided to restructure the management of H&G CT into two tiers: a Council, which is the board of trustees, and an executive board to which Council delegates responsibility for H&G CT's day to day activities. This kind of arrangement is in accordance with our Articles of Association and is increasingly common in bodies like ours which are seeking to improve their operational effectiveness.

The first step is to recruit a chief executive, on a voluntary basis, to lead the executive board, and CoM spent 20 October in a third workshop, led by Clive, to prepare for this task. We are fortunate to have his experience, and also the help of a senior head-hunter, John Macleod, who has volunteered to lead us in finding the right person for this vital role.

The first task for the chief executive will be to work with CoM to refine our ideas for the new structure. As always we will keep you updated in The Wharfinger, in the e-newsletter and on our website.

The first task for the Chief Executive will be to work with the existing Council of Management to refine our ideas for the new structure and to lead the executive board.

Towing TOW!


Through Birmingham to Alvechurch on its way to Gloucester

H&G CT's 70' heritage mud hopper, Tow, was towed by Muskrat, a 35' foot narrow boat, from Camp Hill to Alvechurch, on Sunday 23 and Monday 24 October in fine weather along the Birmingham Canal Navigations.

The journey involved 25 locks in Birmingham from the top of the Camp Hill Flight of 6 locks, through the Ashted flight (6 locks), then the Farmer's Bridge flight (13 locks) and through Gas Street Basin, then the Wast Hills Tunnel (2,276 yards) and down to Scarfield Wharf in Alvechurch.


Members of Birmingham Canal Navigation Society helped us rediscover Tow's location after it had been moved mysteriously from its mooring on Icknield Port Loop to the Cement Arm at the top of the Camp Hill locks. BCNS also volunteered their help, in the form of two very able boaters, Jeff Carter and Paul Smith, in this weekend collaborative project. Muskrat's owner, H&G CT Vice Chairman John Hammond, who has 30 years of canal boating experience and is a member of BCNS,





"My initial reaction was why Wales?" said Paul.

From the very first visit to the new location, it was apparent that the site has tremendous potential for improvement for it to become a positive attraction in the local area whilst our major H&G Canal hydro and lock project is designed, negotiated and funded.

Janet Moult announced at the AGM her intention to retire as Chairman of the H&G CT, and from the CoM, "prior to the end of the year". Having stepped down from this important post once before, and subsequently been persuaded take over the reins for a second term of office, she said (with a broad smile) "I really mean it this time"!

In April 1999 Janet retired from Reading University Library and she and her late husband Brian swiftly moved to Herefordshire to 'retire'. The removal lorry could hardly have been out of sight before they were both greatly assisting that summer with the significant H&G CT presence at the National Waterways Festival, on the River Severn, at Worcester, Brian took over as Chairman of the H&G Trading Company in 2000 and, following his sad death the previous autumn, in 2003 Janet joined CoM and took over as Chairman of the Trading Company.

Janet first became Chairman of H&G CT in the autumn of 2006 - 51/2 years later she was reporting back on her first period as Chairman with a number of memorable (and some significant) achievements. Excellent publicity from our 25th anniversary celebrations, new milestones erected, the purchase of Llanthony Lock, Cottages and land (thanks to the Beth Gadesden bequest), the opening of the slipway and first stage restoration through Aylestone Park (first boats on the Canal in Hereford since 1880!), the bedrooms at The Wharf House being completed and, for good measure, work well under way at Vineyard Hill and about to commence at Moat Farm.

After a 2 year interval (I quite deliberately didn't say 'rest'!) in December 2013 Janet was persuaded to once again take on the role as Chairman of H&G CT. During these latter 3 years just some of the notable achievements included publication Rescued from Obscurity, construction of the large overflow weir at Aylestone Park, redevelopment of Holmer Trading Estate

approved with some £3million of 'planning gain' for the Canal, work at Oxenhall extending to Newent Station, the Dymock Partnership successfully completed with the additional 'bricks and mortar' asset of our house there, the purchase of what is now Malswick House and the refurbishment of the Cottages at Llanthony being completed.

Janet is quick to acknowledge just how much H&G CT value each and every one of our volunteers - no matter what they might be doing to assist our ongoing success. Now it is our turn to thank Janet for the thousands of hours that she has so far spent (supported by daughter Becca) as a volunteer in a multitude of roles. Janet has made it clear that she is willing, for the time being, to continue as Chairman of H&G Canal Sales & Promotion – in addition to all her other tasks such as distribution of The Wharfinger, arranging speakers for the Social Evenings (see request on page 20), organising the Grand Holiday Draw ... a most sincere 'thank you Janet' for everything that you have done - so far! » CRP

The towpath has been strimmed and kept clear. A large fallen branch was logged up and stacked. Thanks to Wilf for organising two work parties to strim the spoil heaps and remove any large pieces of wood.



YOUR HELP PLEASE

John Pritchard would like to hear from you if you can assist in his pursuit of the 'holy grail' – aquatic weed extermination! {I think you may have to settle for "best practice" in controlling it, John! Ed.} As with everything that we do we are always willing to learn. John (contact details inside back cover) would like to hear from anyone who can assist him at Aylestone Park (and the H&G CT in general) with the identification of the aquatic weed species and recommending best means of control/prevention and disposal.

For a number of years the use of slowly rotting barley straw has helped to control blanket weed at Over and our friends at the Gloucester & District Model Boat Club have been trialling a system they developed of heavy chains dragged along the canal to help remove other types of weed. We know that (full size!) boat movement helps to reduce the rate of growth – but with the downside that it can also spread the weed. The historic weed cutting boat, under restoration at Over, might have been brought in to assist (and would have been trailable between 'wet' sites) but health and safety aspects arising from the old design preclude this.



The Team continue to meet the challenge head on and have also been preparing for a visit from "the man with a tractor" who will be giving the hedge, canal banks and canal bottom their autumn short back and sides.

Dymock

As reported in the last edition our next task was to have the basin filled and the borehole completely installed. At the present time water is still being pumped into the basin and, as can be seen from the photos, it's slowly filling up.

The borehole was designed to 'top up' the water, not fill the basin, so it is doing this slowly but surely! The contractor has not yet completed his work (due to difficulties when drilling the borehole); completed the adjacent towpath will be finished along with the planned overflow.

Volunteers have been working to clear weeds and the first cut of the towpath has been completed. The trees and shrubs have taken well, and therefore next year we should have a good display of slowly maturing trees. Planting of native waterside plants in the spring should enhance the overall picture. »»WJ





Much of our work this time has been devoted to completing the clearance of the former Willows Nursery site area and preparing the whole site for the Open day we held in September.

The wooden footbridge over the lock was found to be rotting away so remedial work was promptly commenced and has now been completed. The three trailers/site huts hidden in the 'jungle' have now been released and moved out so that the surrounding area could be cleared revealing some ground which we had not seen since the purchase of The Willows in 2004. The brambles were resistant to the weedkiller which we eventually managed to spray on but strimmers and then mowers did the job and are now keeping everything under control. Some small patches of Japanese Knotweed in the wooded area have been sprayed twice this year by Paul Henshaw and are now looking a bit sick but experience has shown us that it will take at least another couple of sprays next year before we can expect it to die. Goodness knows where it came from in the first place!

Permissive Path

The permissive path which we opened last year is now regularly walked by locals and H&G Canal Trust members. It is well signed with information boards at intervals. There are places where nettles and Himalayan balsam try to encroach but they are easily held back by a slasher now and then. Our trial of leaving the towpath with a minimum cut this year will not be continued next year because we think it does not present the canal in the best light and in particular our show-piece area around the lock and cottage.

Good Neighbours

We have a good working relationship with our neighbour, the 'skip man'. He not only hires out skips but has a small excavator which he has generously used to level off a large hump in our track and to open up an access, through some very rough ground, to a level open area behind the ladder factory. This will soon be completely cleared of vegetation and will become the new parking area for our 3 trailers and various other bits and pieces which are in the way elsewhere. He also provides us with any spare pallets he has which are essential in our work at the station for storing bricks etc. In return he is given any scrap metal which we come across.

Station Site

The station has now become the focus of much of our work and, together with the Saturday group under Wilf Jones, the clearance of the old station platforms is continuing. There is still old stock left by the builders, the previous tenants, which we are only just uncovering. Much of it is in good order and will be sold on to provide income for the Trust and the future plans for the station. One item which we found under a pile of old paint tins and general

rubbish was a long wooden bench and on cleaning it up it became obvious it was quite old and well made. I mentioned this to a friend of mine who showed some interest and as soon as he saw it he offered.

a substantial sum which was eagerly grabbed. It will apparently form the frontage of a new antique shop which he plans to open soon. It took some moving as it was extremely heavy but well worth the effort.

Another item which is now more visible is an old railway footbridge which will eventually span the canal here. It came from Llanthony, near Gloucester, and has been lying in the undergrowth next to the platform here for many years now. It looks as though there will be work commencing on restoring the platforms early next year so how long before the bridge is spanning a new stretch of the H&G Canal? Watch this space.

Report

The open day was a great success despite drizzly weather in the

morning. A steady stream of visitors came to see the work done so far at the station and a good proportion of them finished up at Oxenhall Parish Hall for tea and home-made cakes. Several new members were enrolled and generally the comments from the public were very positive and looking forward to seeing the proposed changes through this site coming to fruition.

Moat Farm

It's all quiet on the Moat Farm front. That is, business as usual with routine maintenance activity mixed with the continued 'development' of the site.

Routine maintenance, as always, involves regular mowing of the grassy areas we endeavour to maintain in that style. The 'wilder' areas occasionally need some intervention in order to enhance the habitats that we have created. The team have been busy working on the 'off-side' bank selectively pruning and strimming to preserve the hard won semi-managed areas we were able to create two or three years ago.

The excavator has been kept busy dredging and

shaping the canal bed extending the length that had been completed last year. We have now accumulated a large volume of spoil arising from this work which will be relocated around the site during the next dumper session.

A problem arose with one of the excavator tracks when the main idler wheel bearing failed. Fortunately the machine was in a relatively convenient position when this occurred and replacing the failed component proved to be a straightforward challenge for our volunteer mechanics despite the weight of the idler wheel assembly.

Over Basin & Vineyard Hill Ted Beagles

The summer is always a busy season, especially so this year with a very long period of vigorous growth of everything. Keeping on top of the grassed areas has been a demanding job, as well as cutting back shrubs and brambles. The garden areas have required a lot of attention to weed and replant. The weed in the canal basin is prolific, despite the efforts of other canal users to keep it under control. Thank goodness it is easing off as we move into autumn.

'Operation River View' is being mounted by The Wharf House to restore views of the river from the terrace, which over the years have been lost behind willows on

the riverbank and shrubs growing on The Wharf House bank, In combination with The Wharf House staff the shrubs and brambles are being cut

Great wall progress


Bob and Ivor, assisted from time to time by other members of the team in transporting bricks from elsewhere




Water Issues

Maintaining the canal water level has been a challenge throughout late summer. Lack of rain and a long warm period has meant that the level of water in the nearby River Leadon, which is our source of water, has been very low making it difficult to get the pump suction pipe into the fresh water and clear of the mud. We just managed to top up water in the canal for the Festival weekend by pumping during the short periods when the fresh water rose due to backing up on the incoming tide and stopping before the Leadon water became contaminated by the brackish water from

the Severn. Subsequently we have removed the suction pipe completely to clean out the mud and have repositioned it midstream, with ropes attached to both sides of the river. In pulling the pipe out we found it to be damaged at the site of a previous repair patch. This meant we had to cut off about 1metre of the pipe and refit the coupling back on to the remaining piece. The pumping system is now in normal service, and we have developed new skills to refit the end fittings on 6 inch plastic pipes!





Ingenious Repair

For many years our wheeled strimmer has served us well, in cutting through tough banks of brambles and nettles, when it failed dramatically - the head drive shaft having sheared. There seemed to be no way of extracting the broken shaft. However, by perseverance of our mechanical team, and a combination of WD40, heating, a hub puller, and a big hammer over a period of several weeks the broken shaft was finally removed! But the mounting plate had unfortunately broken during the process; not to be outdone, Dave Hurran and Mike Hunt contrived a scheme to repair and put it all together, and the strimmer is back in service once more.

Over Festival.

Throughout August we were busy getting ready for the Over Festival (see page 8), preparing the site for car parking, mending and putting up signs, washing and touching up the paintwork of the heritage boats. H&G CT's trip boat Mr Maysey was prepared ready for two days of hard work, and this year we also ran trips the weekend before for a wedding reception held at The Wharf House. Finally of course everything required packing up and storing ready for next year.

Visitors walking along the towpath at Vineyard Hill during the Festival came across a warning sign saying "Caution bees at work" and were surprised to see a long pole supporting a basket high up one of the ash trees. This had been placed there by Chris, our resident bee keeper, in an attempt to catch a large swarm of bees on the tree trunk. However the bees were not interested as they had already built





WATERWAYS OF BRITAIN


The H&G Canal Trust

The Canal Society, formed in 1983, became the Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal Trust, a registered charity, in 1992. It has an ordinary and corporate membership approaching 1,400, here and abroad.

The original Herefordshire & Gloucestershire Canal

Work started in 1792 reaching Ledbury from Gloucester by 1798. In 1827 Steven Ballard was appointed to oversee the Canal's completion, which reached Hereford in 1845; this was one of the last major canal routes completed in Britain. The Canal stretched from the River Severn at Gloucester, via Newent, Dymock and Ledbury to Hereford, using 22 locks and 3 tunnels. It was closed in 1881 to allow construction of the Ledbury-Gloucester railway which in turn closed in 1964.
